





C. Distribution by Level & Type - Chart









E. Enrollment by Department, Level, & Type - Chart




F. Enrollment by Business Department, All Majors - Charts










G. Enrollment by Dental Hygiene Department - Charts







H. Enrollment by Education Department, All Majors - Charts







I. Enrollment by English Department, All Majors – Charts







J. Enrollment by Fine Arts Department, All Majors - Charts







K. Enrollment by Health and Human Performance Department, All Majors - Charts







L. Enrollment by History Department, All Majors - Charts







M. Enrollment by Mathematics Department, All Majors - Charts







N. Enrollment by Natural Sciences Department, All Majors - Charts







O. Enrollment by Nursing Department. - Charts







P. Enrollment by Religion and Philosophy Department, All Majors - Charts







Q. Enrollment by Social Sciences Department, All Majors - Charts












S. Enrollment by Master of Arts in Teaching – Chart



















F. Freshman 2020 Cohort ACT Scores – Chart




G. 3-Yr. Enrollment Trends by Level – Chart




H. 3-Yr. Enrollment Trends by Attendance Status (Excludes Dual Enrolled) – Chart





K. 3-Yr. Graduate Enrollment Trends by Entry Status – Chart







A. Distribution by Gender – Table




B. Distribution by Gender – Chart




C. Distribution by Race and Ethnicity – Chart


E. Geographic Representation of Students in United States - Map



G. Geographic Representation of Counties in Tennessee - Map



H. Top Enrolled Counties (within Tennessee) - Chart




I. Geographic Representation by Country – Map






L. Distribution by Housing Status (at Census) – Chart




M. Service Hours Trend – Chart

O. Distribution by Religious Groups (at Census) – Chart






Q. Distribution by Income Level (As Reported at Census) – Chart

S. Distribution by Athletic Status (at Census) – Chart







B. Retention Trends for Fall to Fall – First-Time, Full-Time Cohort – Chart




C. Comparison of Retention on National, State, and SACSCOC Peer Levels – Table


D. Retention Trends for Fall to Fall – Transfer Cohort – Chart

A. 3-Yr. Trends, Distribution by Degree Level – Chart






A. 4, 5, and 6-Yr. Graduation Rates for First-Year, Full-Time Fall 2015 Cohort – Chart











Total Percentage of Aid Awarded to All Students



Total Amount of Aid Awarded to All Students







B. 3-Yr. Trend Financial Aid Awards for First-Time Freshman* - Chart


Total Percentage of Aid Awarded to First-Time Freshmen



Total Amount of Aid Awarded to First-Time Freshmen




Average Amount of Aid Awarded to First-Time Freshmen




