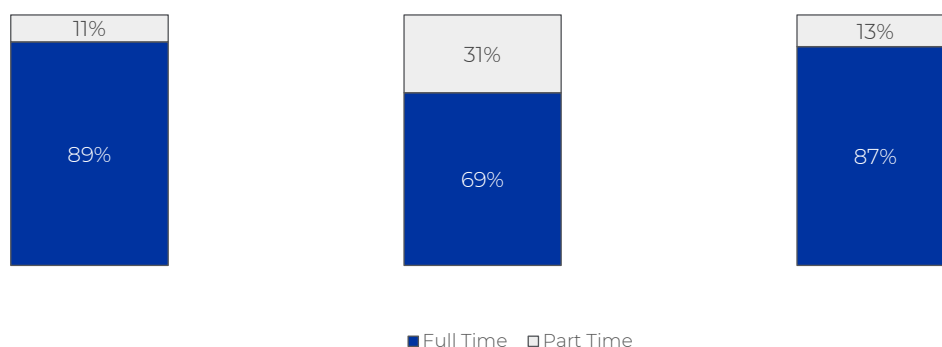

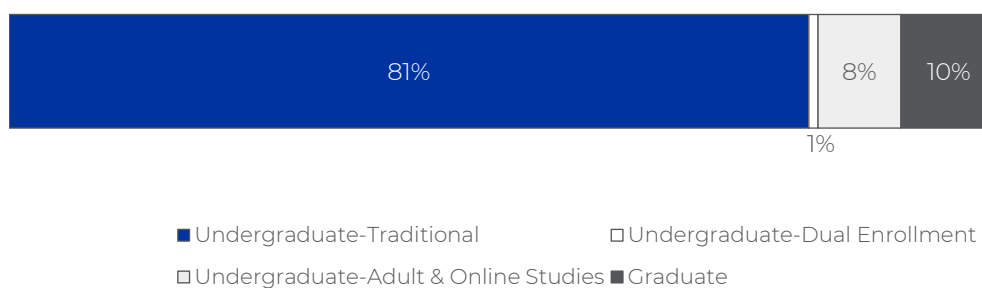

### B. Enrollment by Department, Level, & Type – Chart

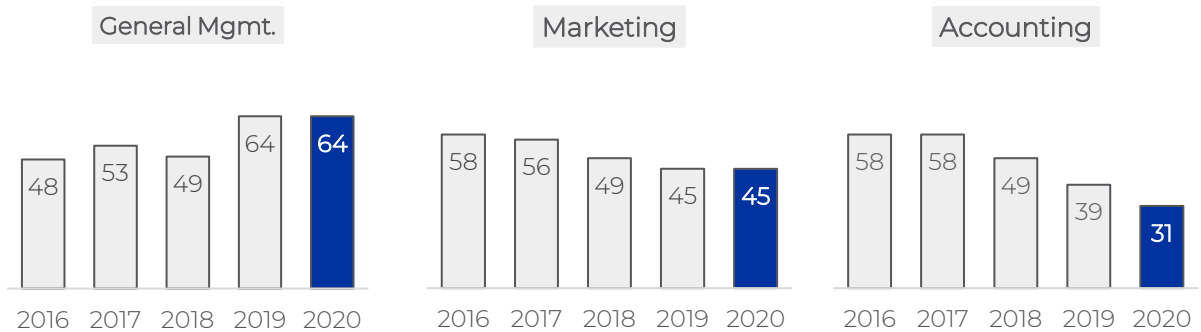


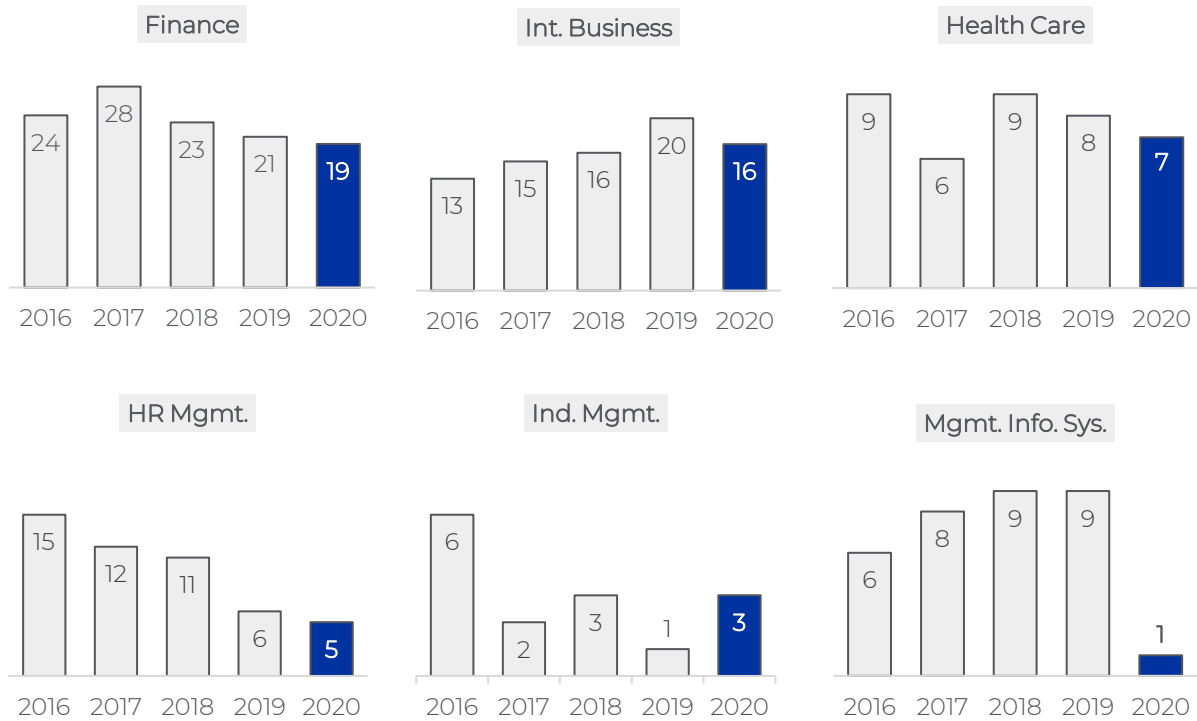

Enrollment Count by Business Program (2016, 2020)

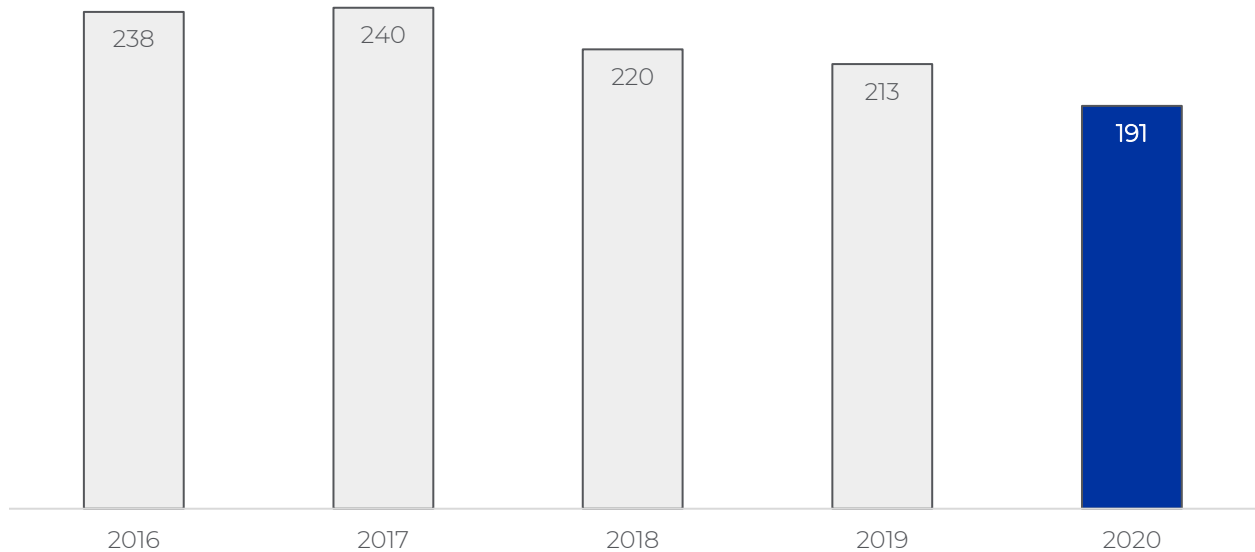

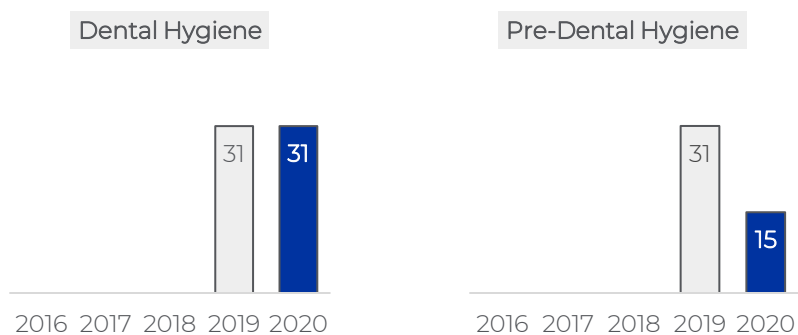
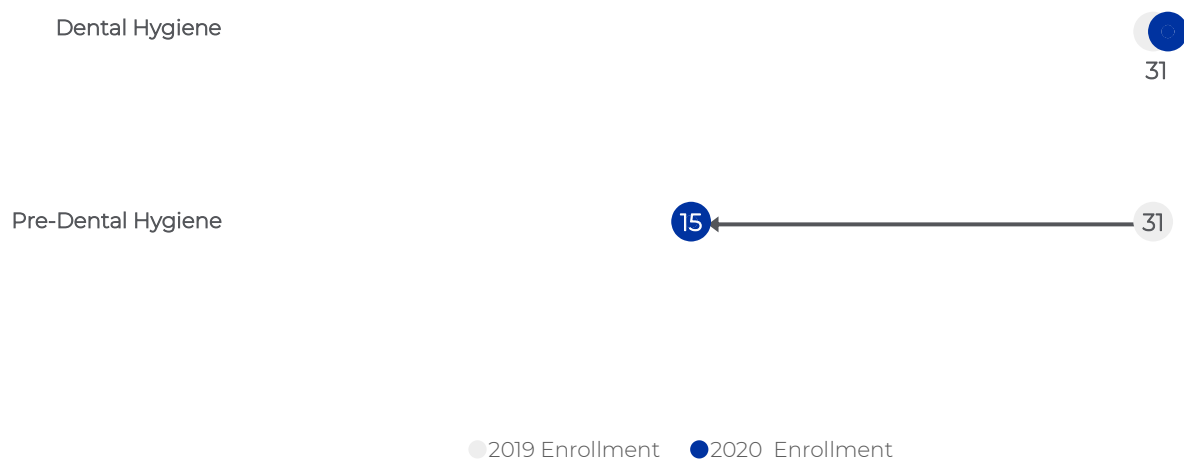


Total Enrollment in Business Department Over Time (2016-2020)



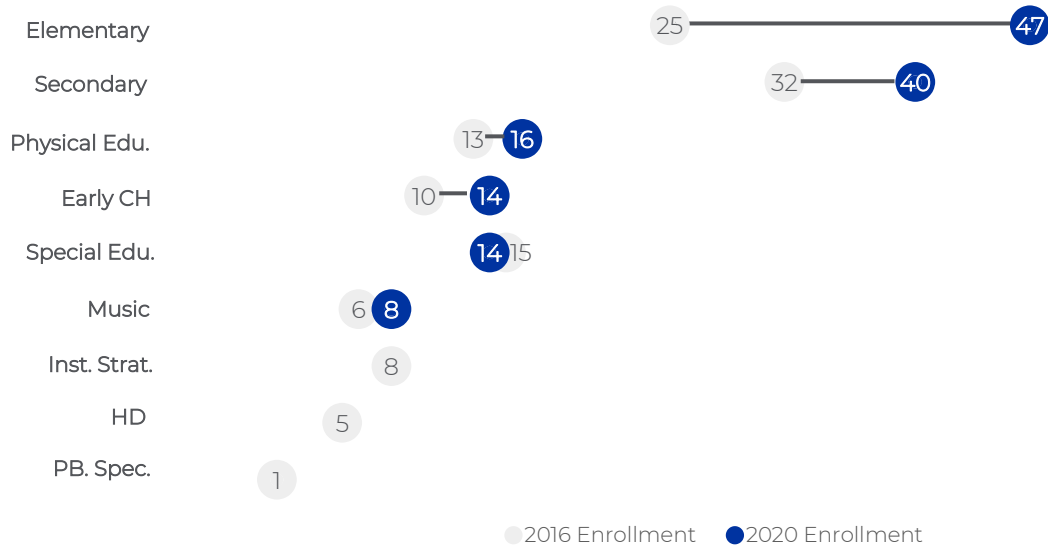
## D. Enrollment by Dental Hygiene Department – Charts

Enrollment Count by Dental Program (2019-2020)

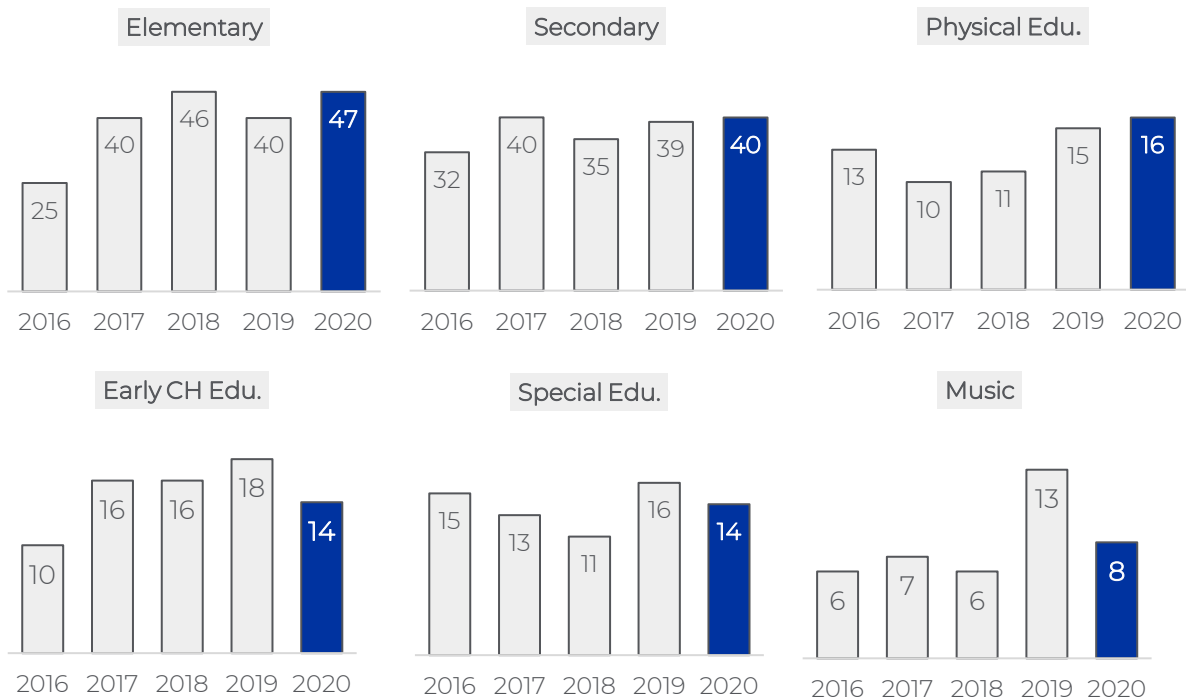

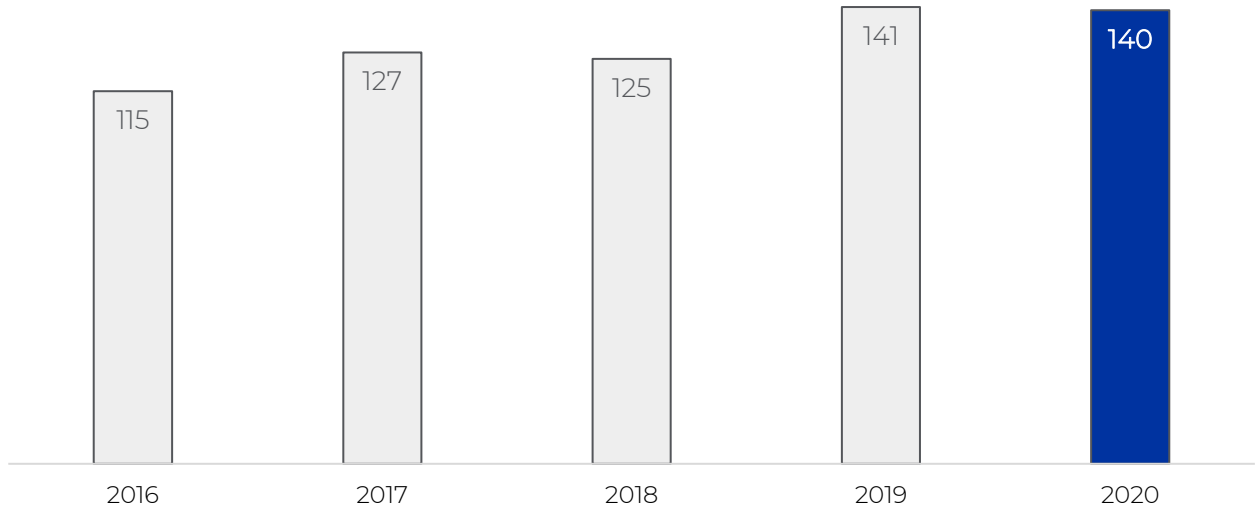
Enrollment Count by Education Program (2016, 2020)

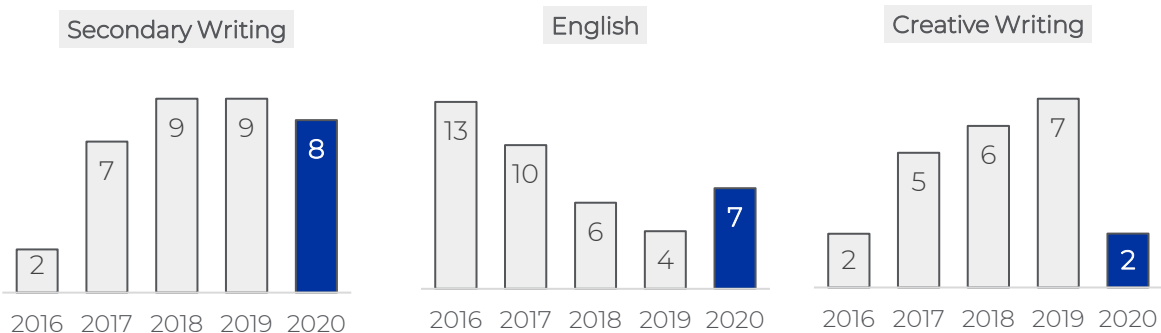
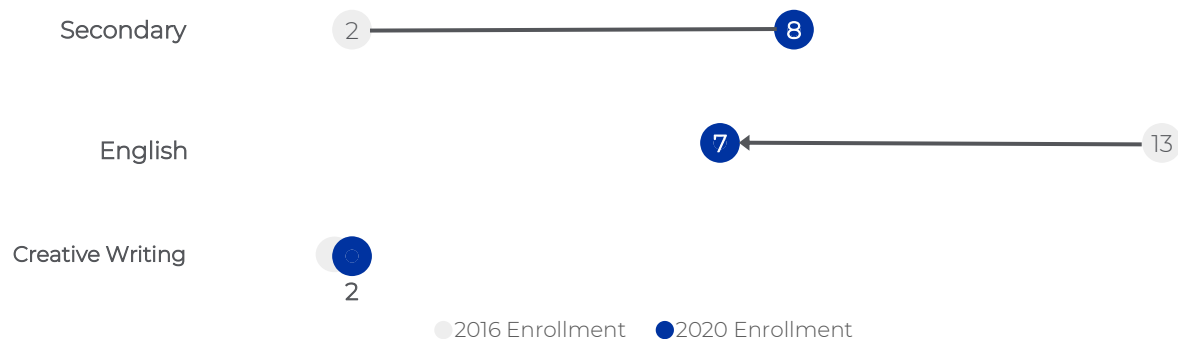


Total Enrollment in Education Department Over Time (2016-2020)

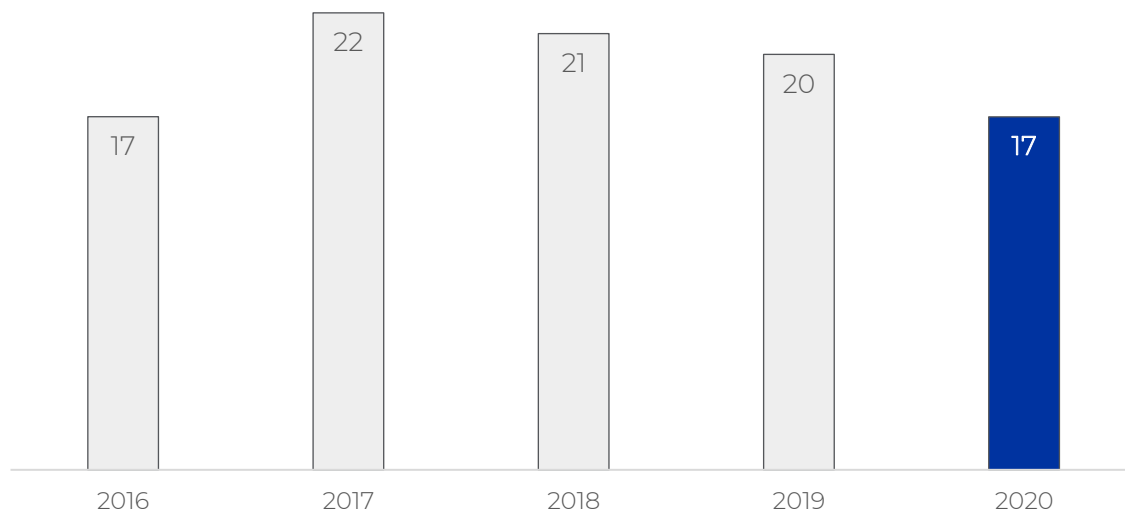

Enrollment Count by English Program (2016, 2020)

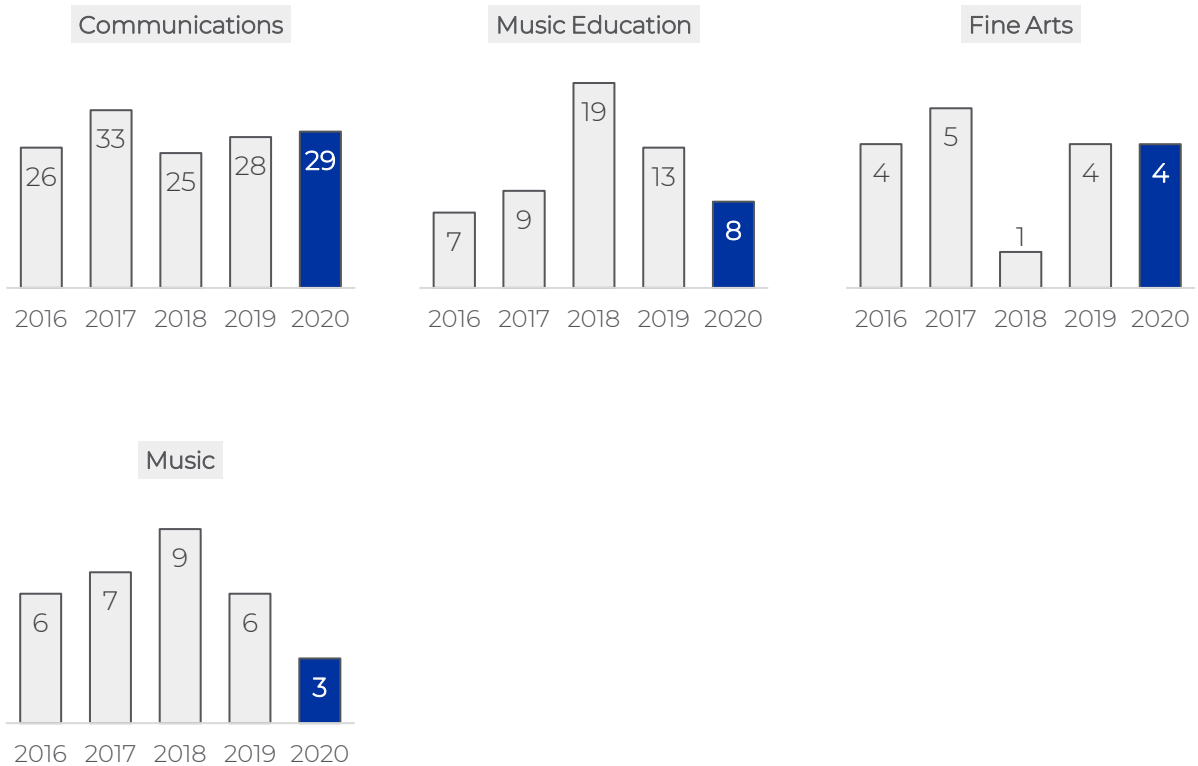
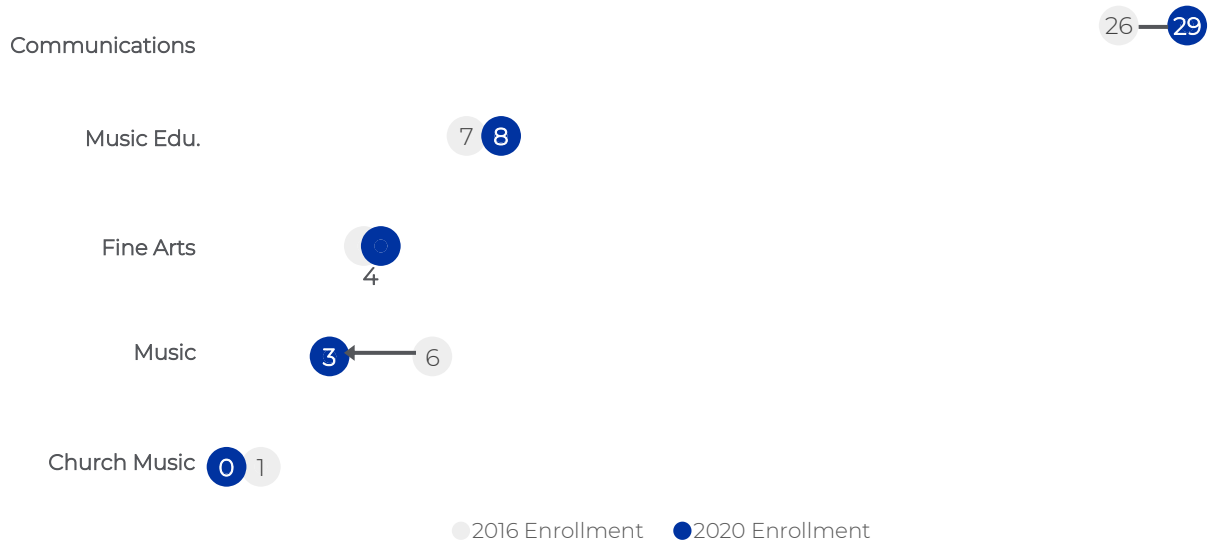


Total Enrollment in English Department Over Time (2016-2020)



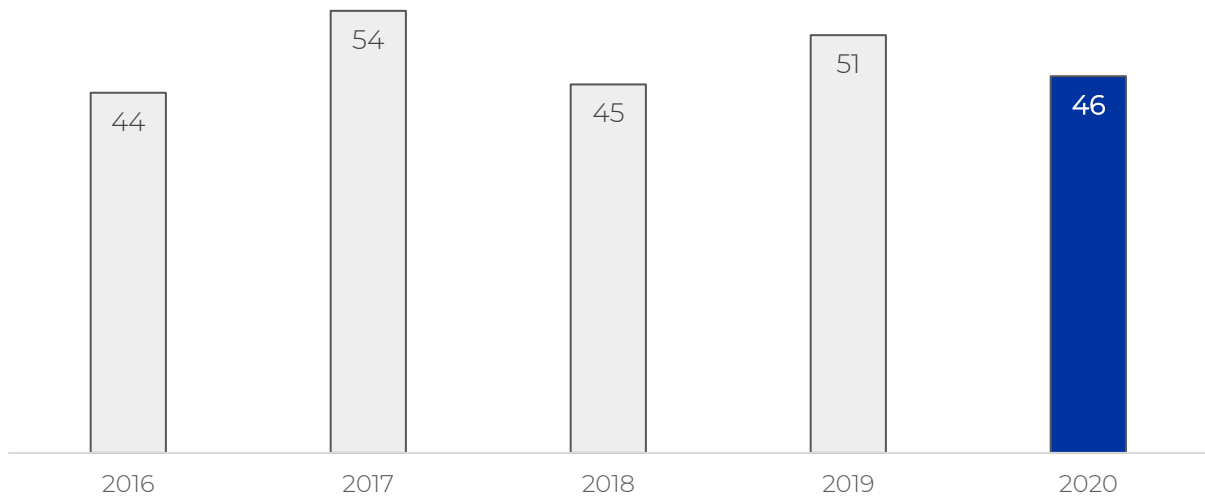
## G. Enrollment by Fine Arts Department, All Majors – Charts

Enrollment Count by Fine Arts Program (2016, 2020)



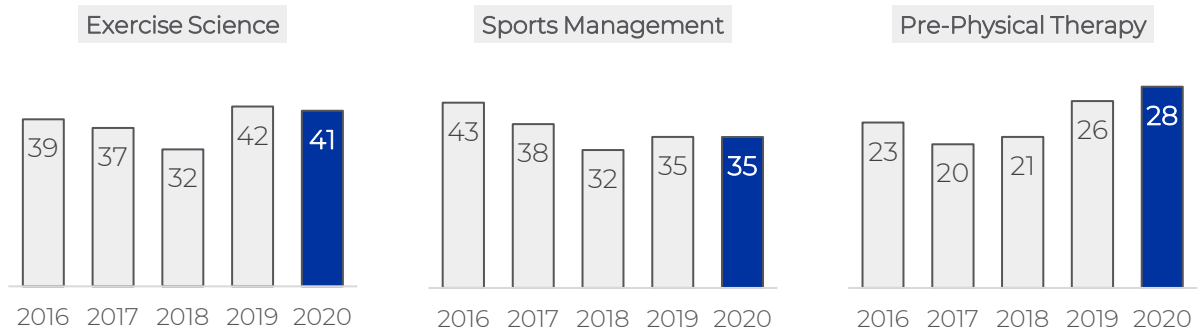
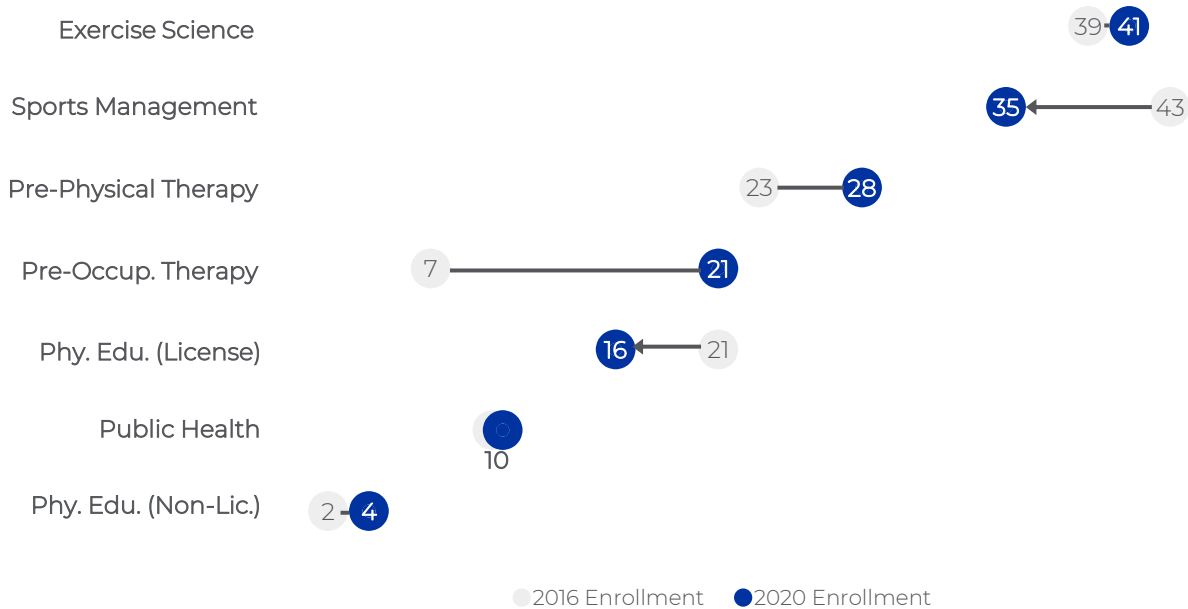


Total Enrollment in Fine Arts Department Over Time (2016-2020)

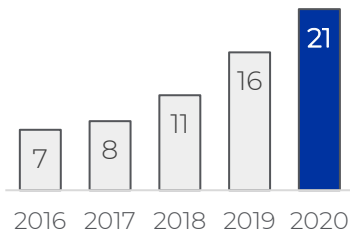

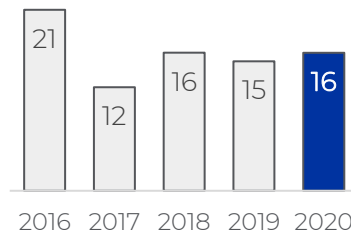
Enrollment Count by Health and Human Performance Department Over Time

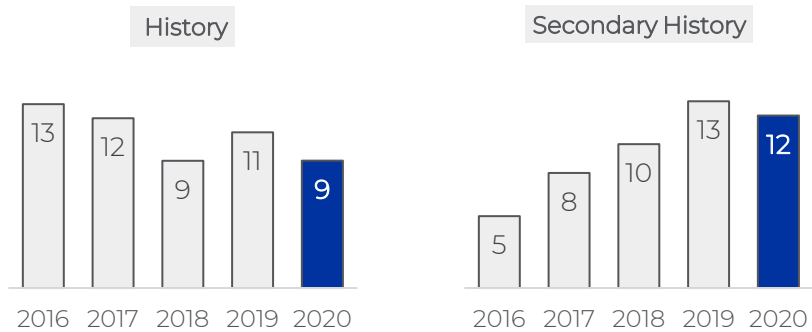
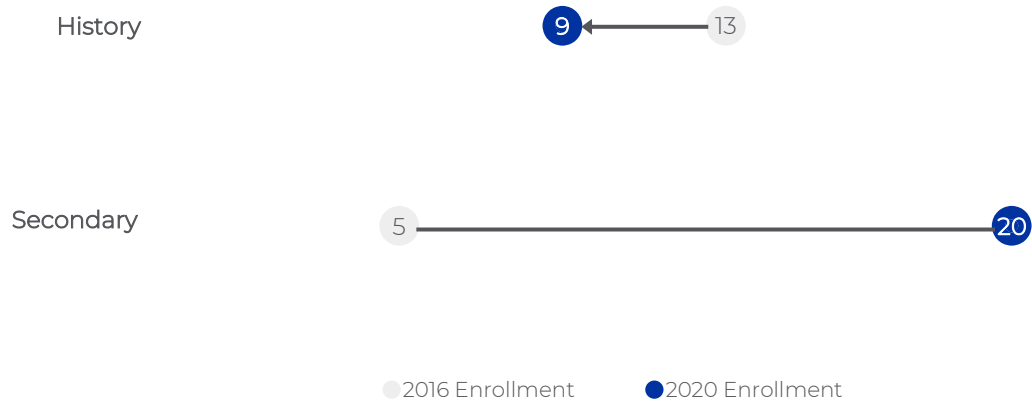


Total Enrollment in Health and Human Performance Department Over Time (2016-2020)

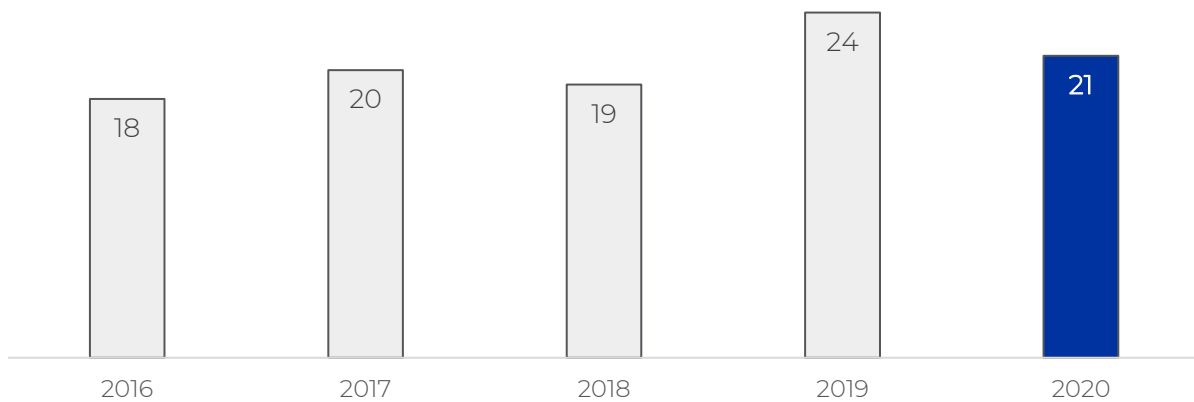

Enrollment Count by History Program (2016, 2020)

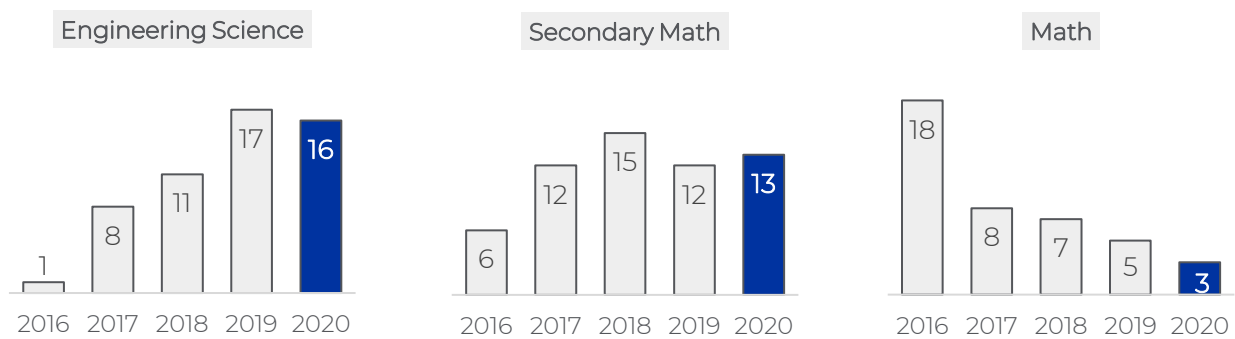
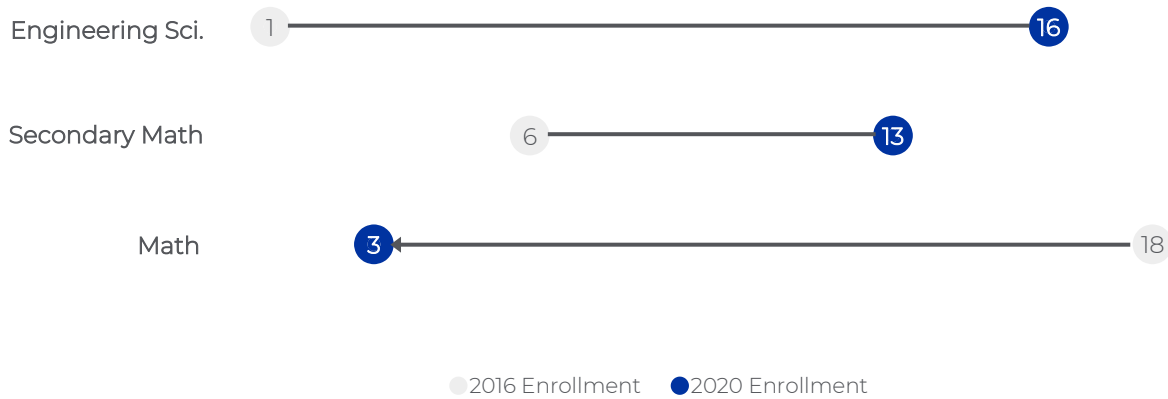


Total Enrollment in History Department Over Time (2016-2020)

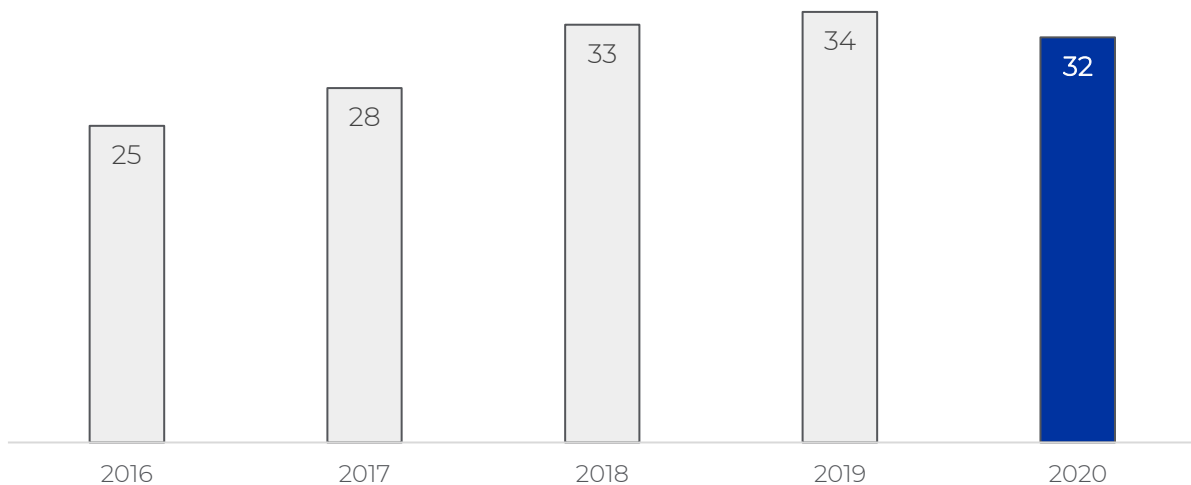


## J. Enrollment by Mathematics Department, All Majors – Charts

Enrollment Count by Mathematics Program (2016, 2020)

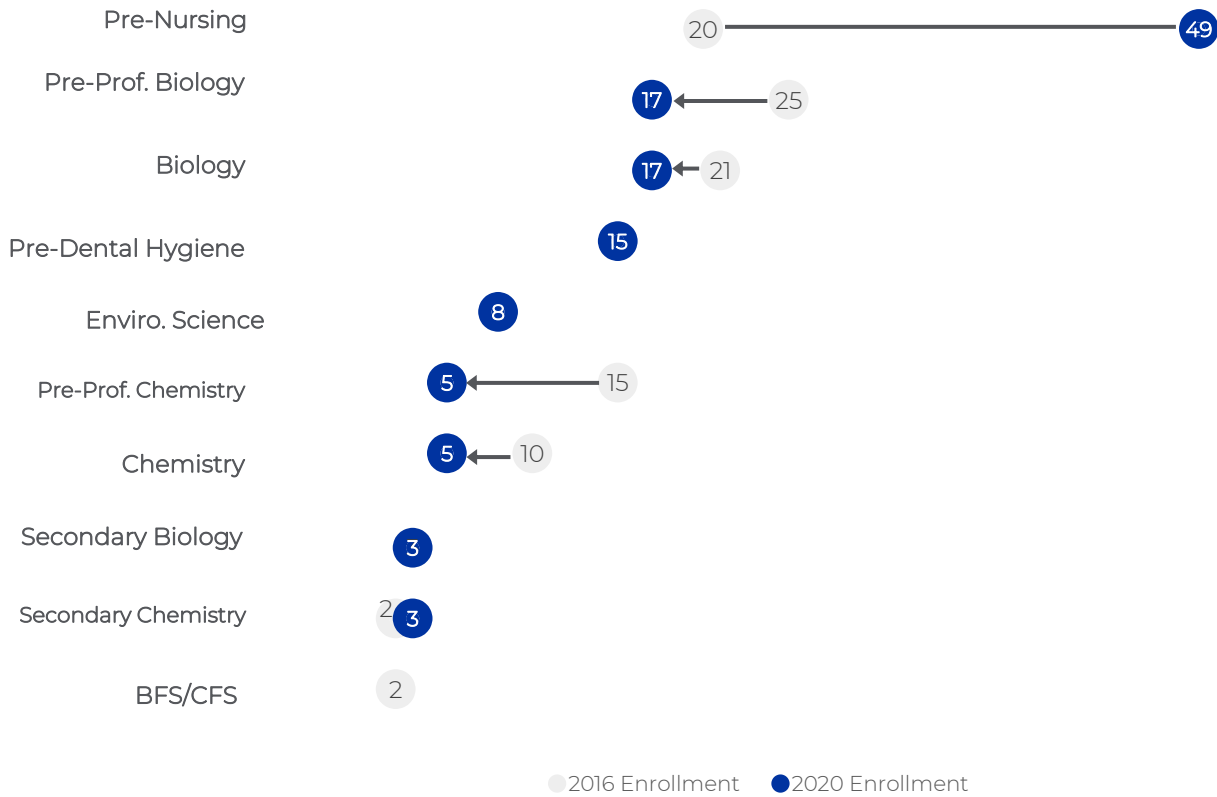


Total Enrollment in Mathematics Department Over Time (2016-2020)

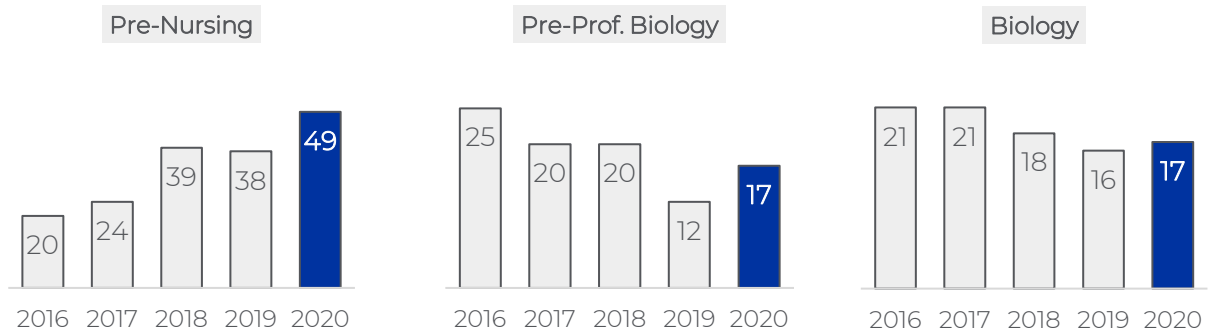


## K. Enrollment by Natural Sciences Department, All Majors – Charts

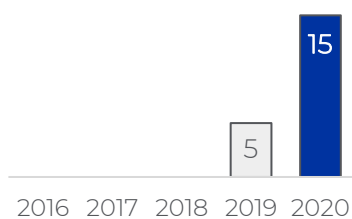
Enrollment Count by Natural Sciences Program (2016, 2020)



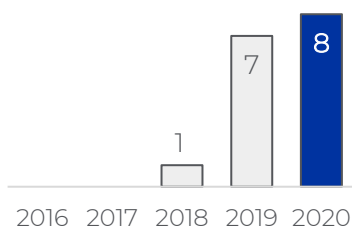

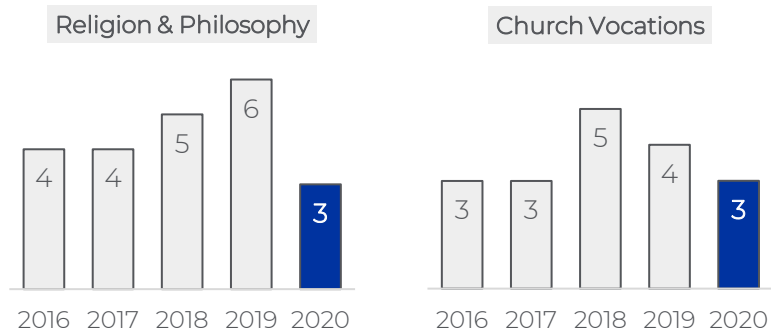
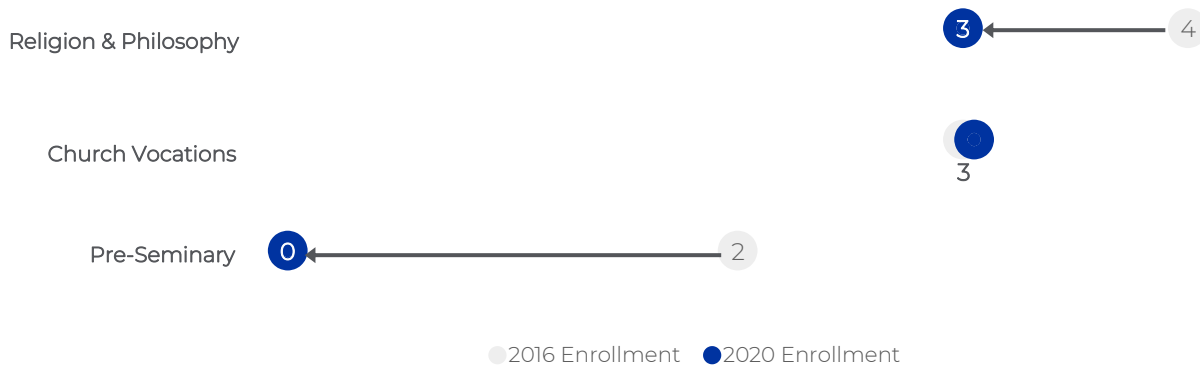


Total Enrollment in Natural Sciences Department Over Time (2016-2020)

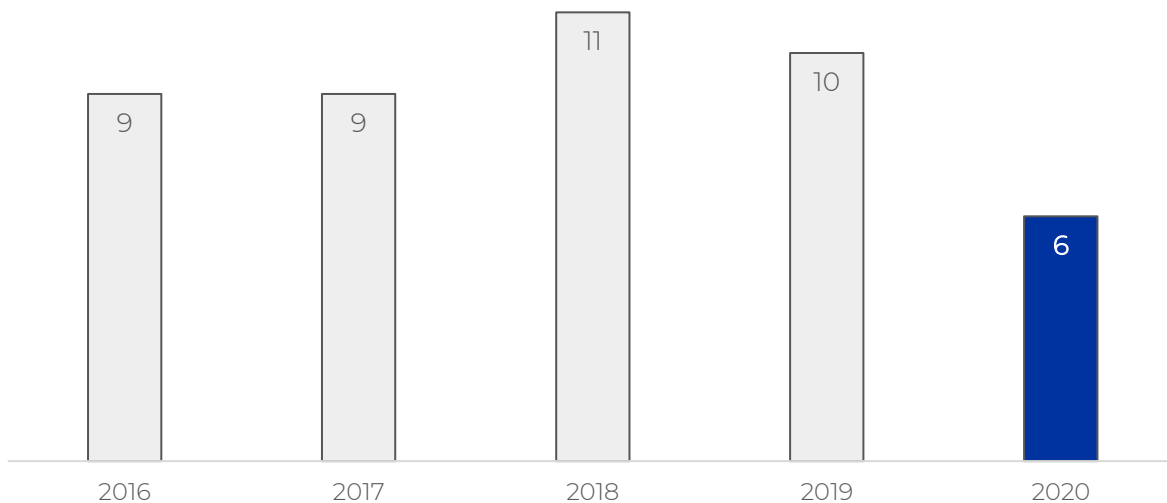

Enrollment Count by Religion and Philosophy Program (2016, 2020)



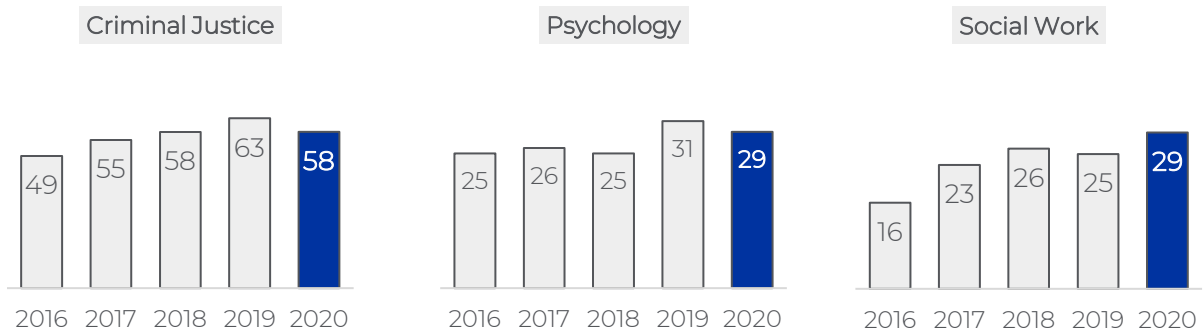

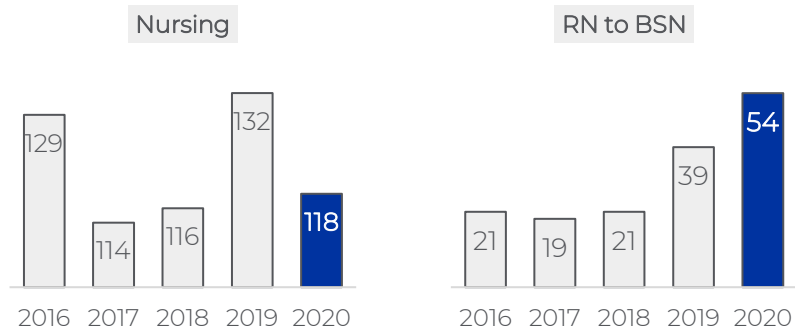
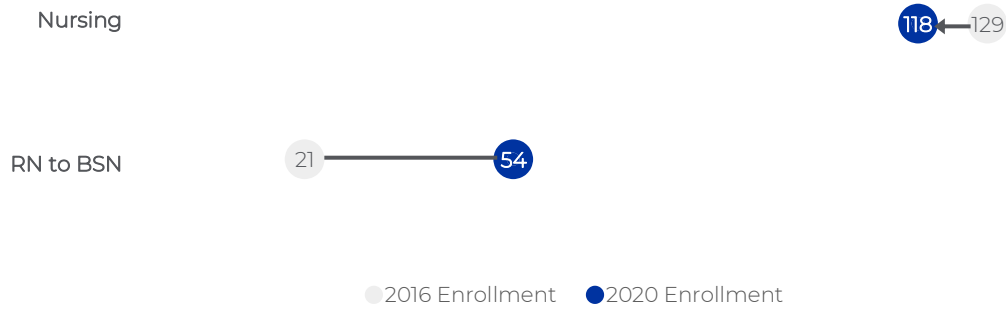


Total Enrollment in Social Sciences Department Over Time (2016-2020)

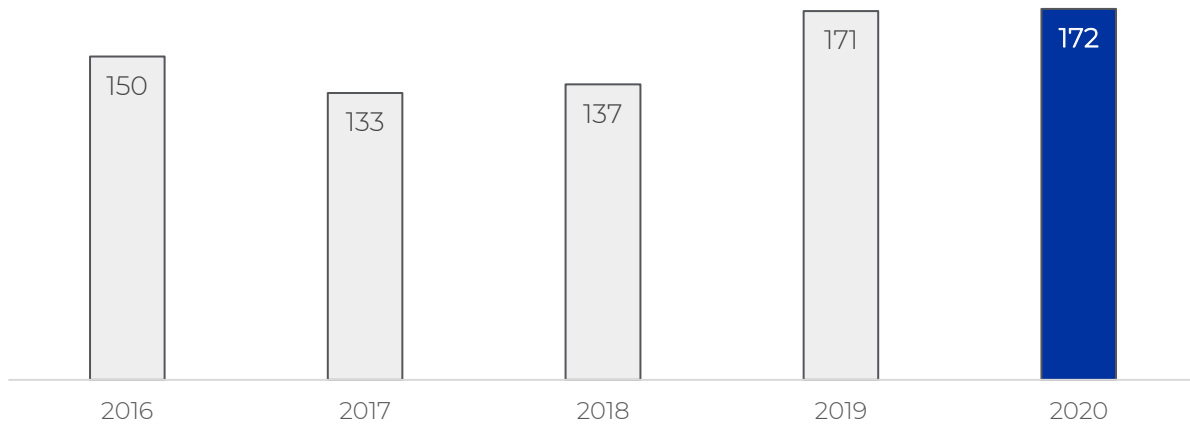


## N. Enrollment by Nursing Department, All Majors – Charts

Enrollment Count by Nursing Program (2016, 2020)

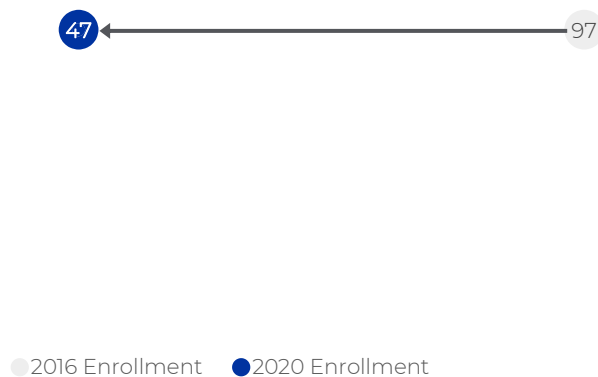


Total Enrollment in Nursing Department Over Time (2016-2020)

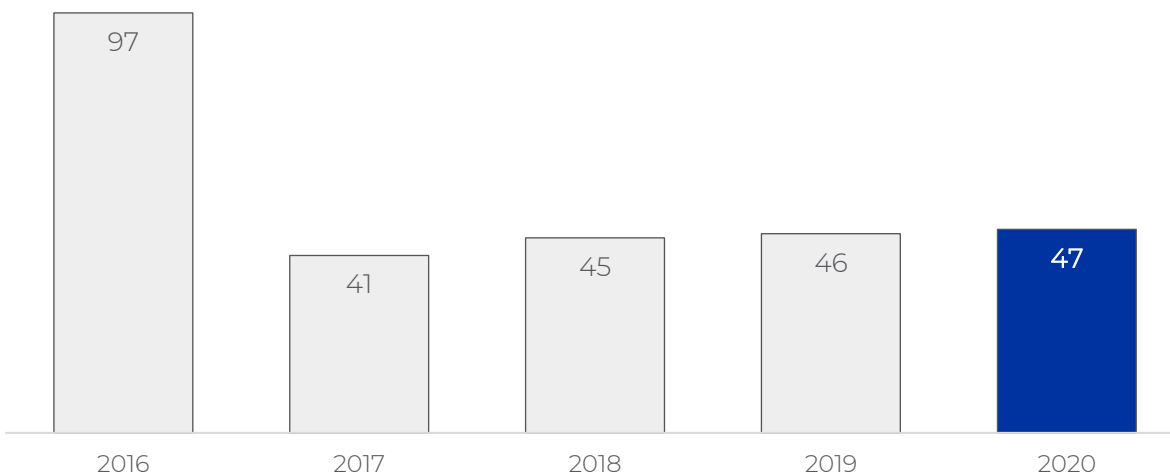


## O. Enrollment by Management Excellence – Charts

Enrollment Count for Management Excellence Over Time (2016, 2020)

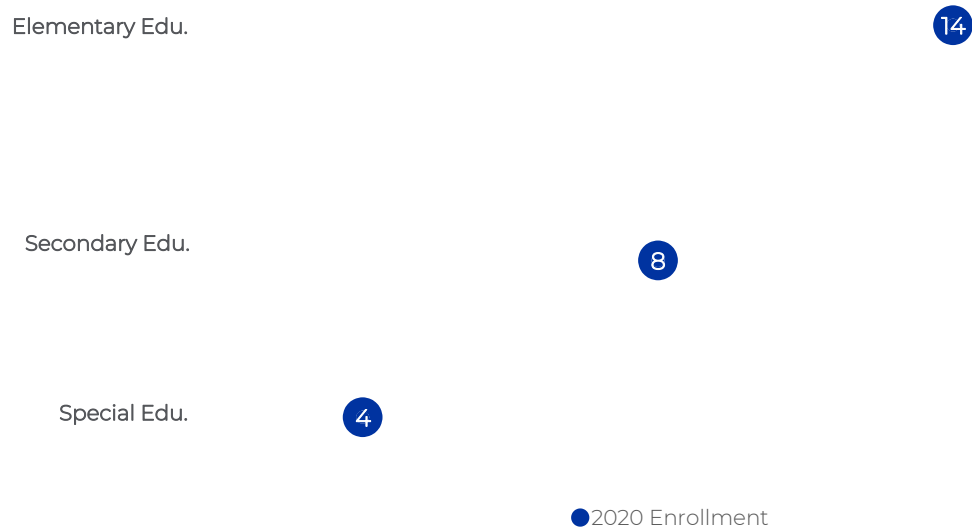


Total Enrollment in Management Excellence Over Time (2016-2020)

Enrollment Count by MAT Program Over Time (2016, 2020)

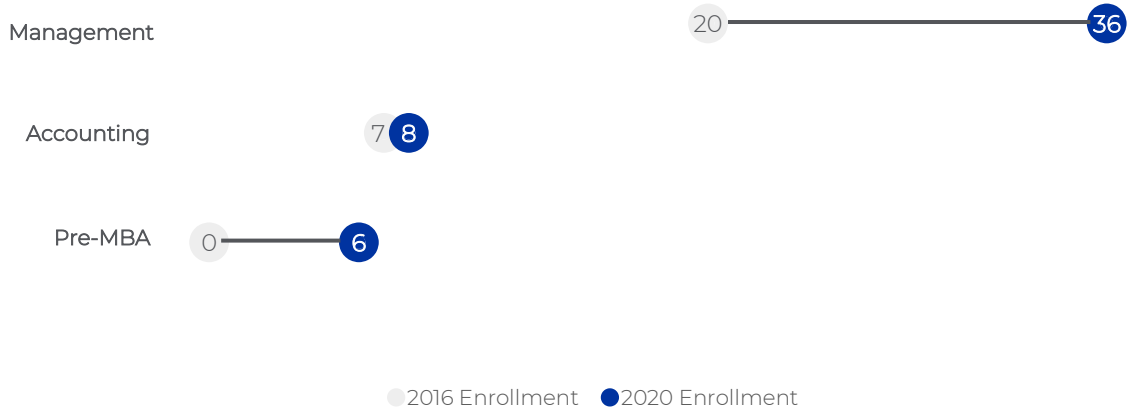


Total Enrollment in Masters of Teaching Over Time (2016-2020)

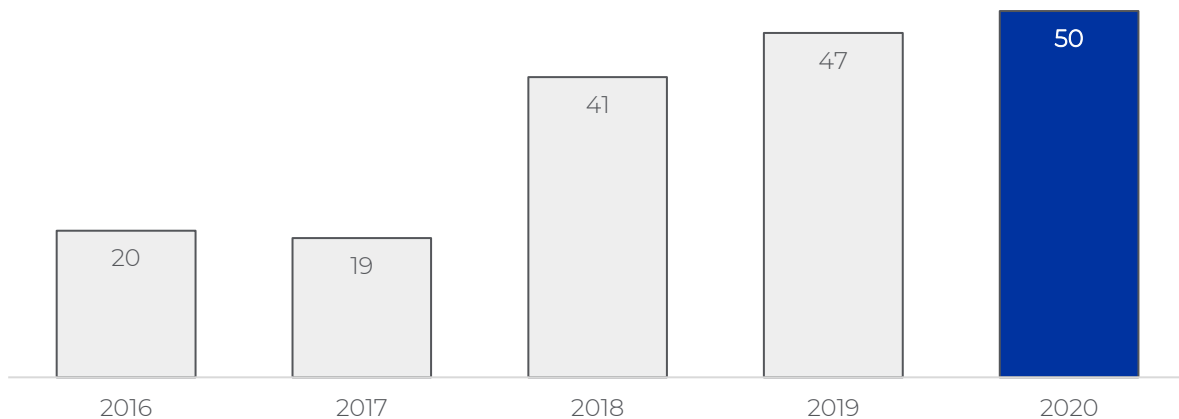


## Q. Enrollment by Master of Business Administration – Charts

Enrollment Count by MBA Program Over Time (2016, 2020)

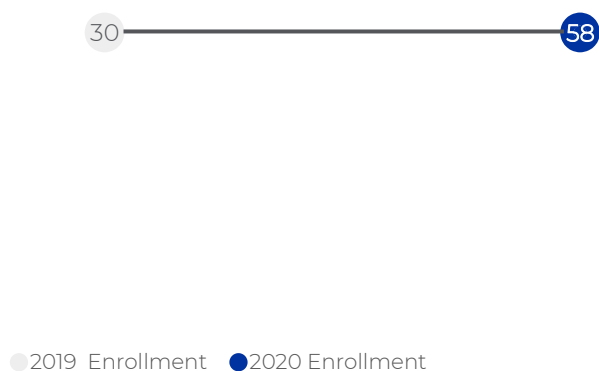


Total Enrollment in MBA Program Over Time (2016-2020)

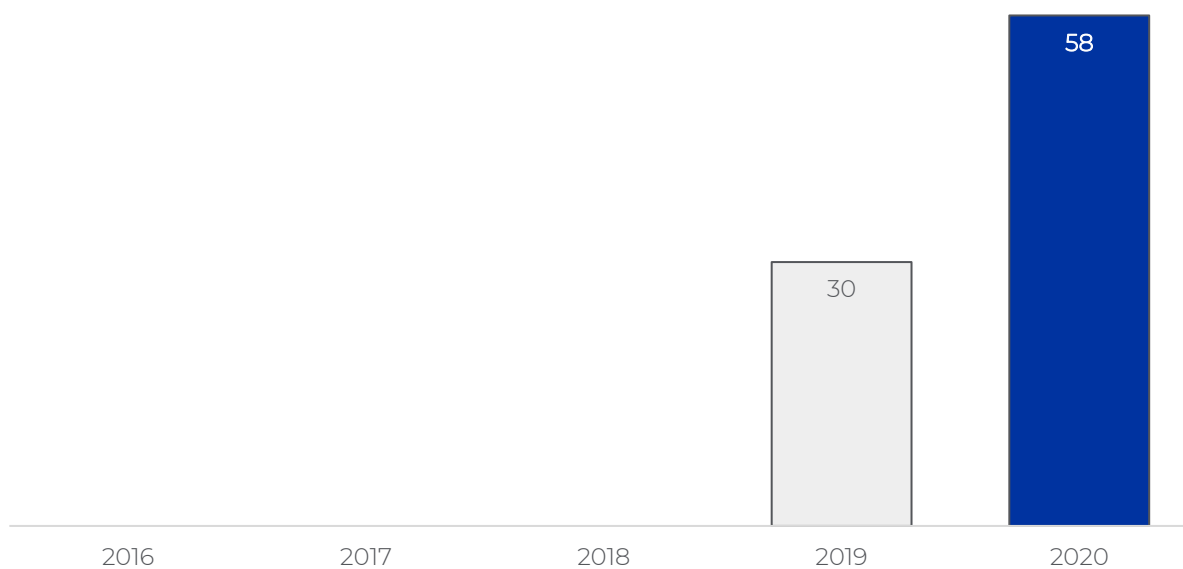

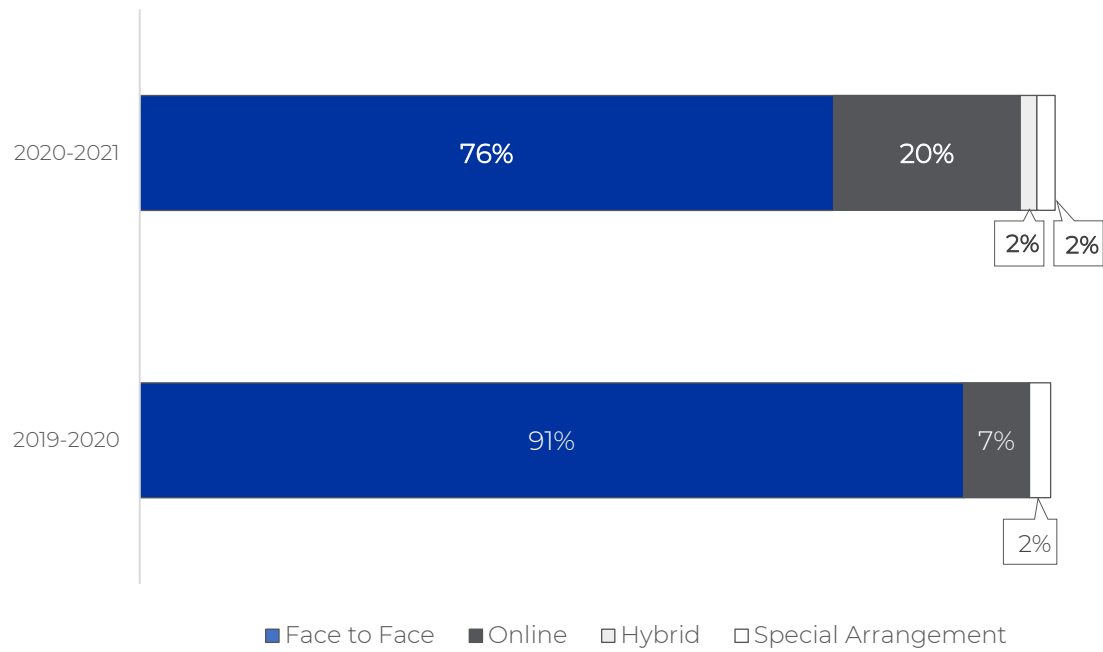
Enrollment in Masters in Occupational Therapy Over Time (2019-2020)

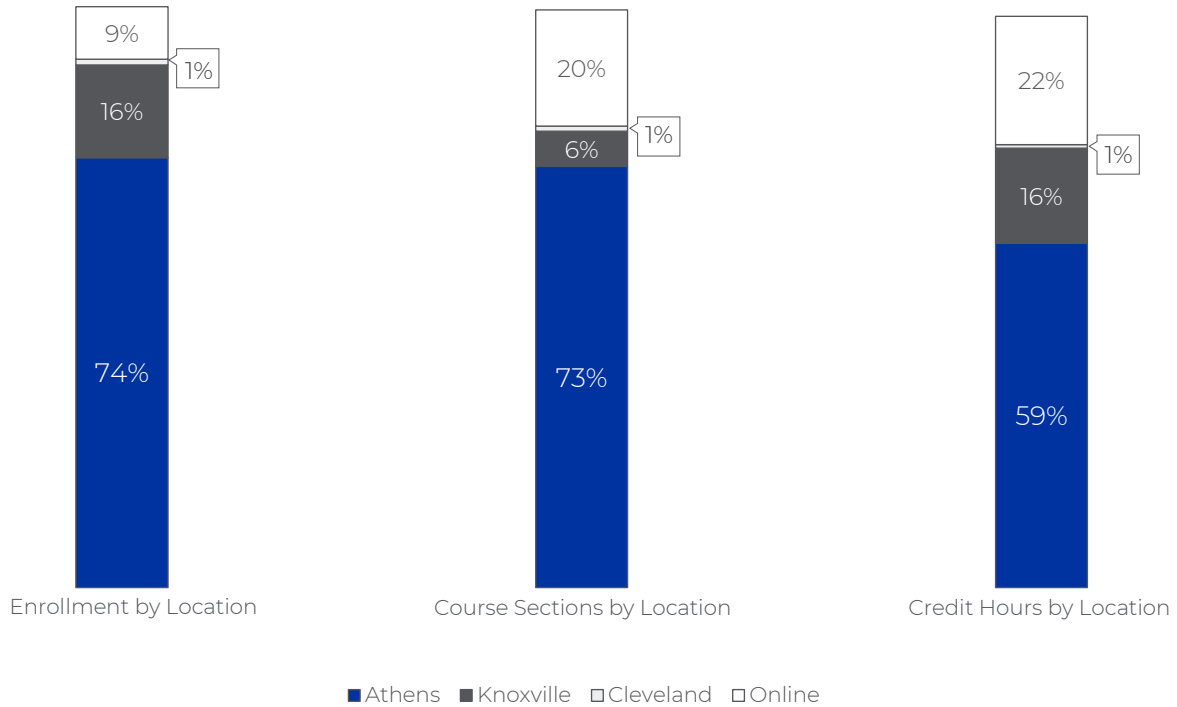

**X. Distribution of Student Headcount Enrollment by Location & Course Sections Taught – Chart**



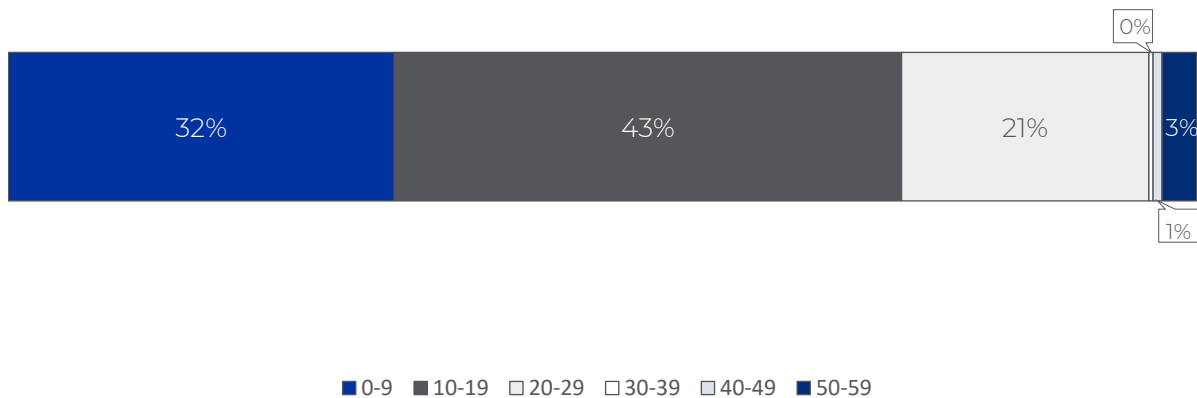

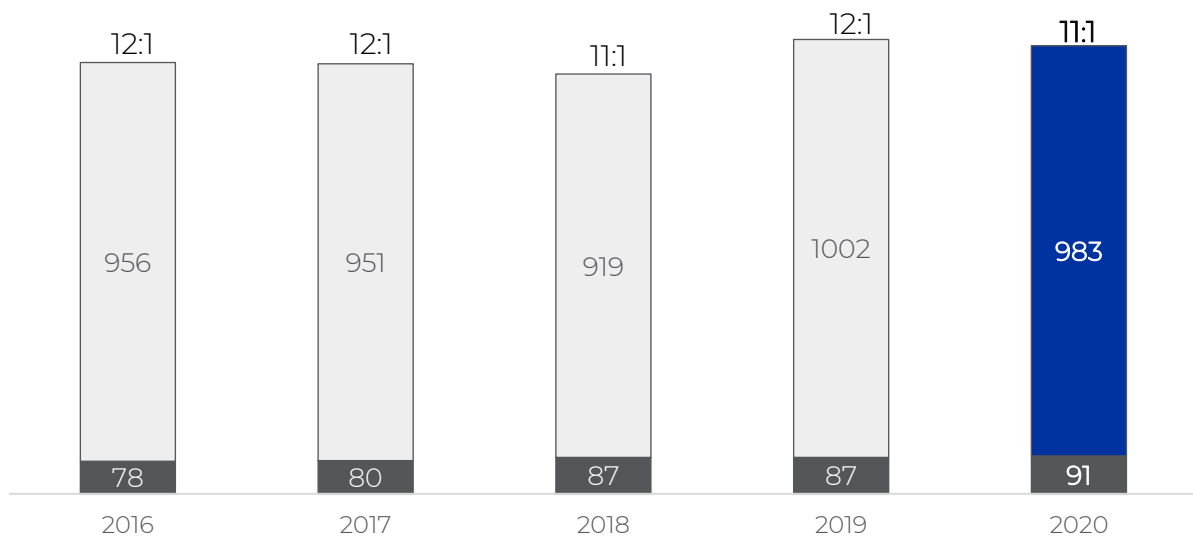

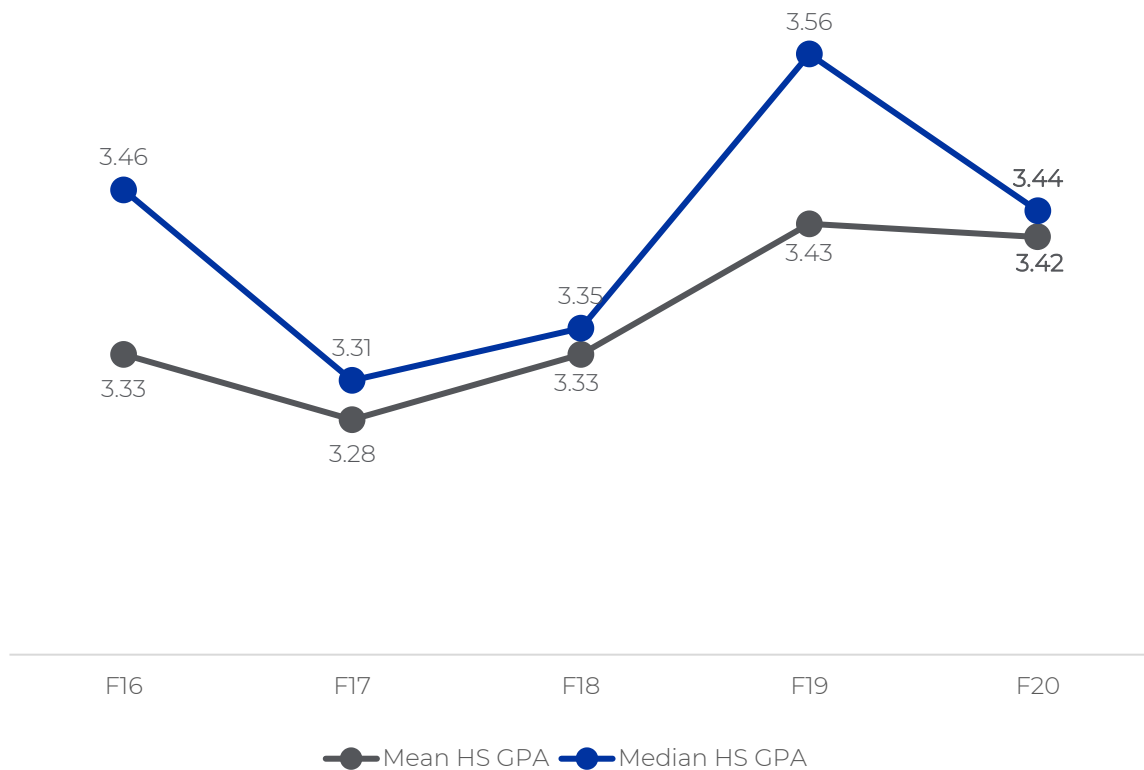

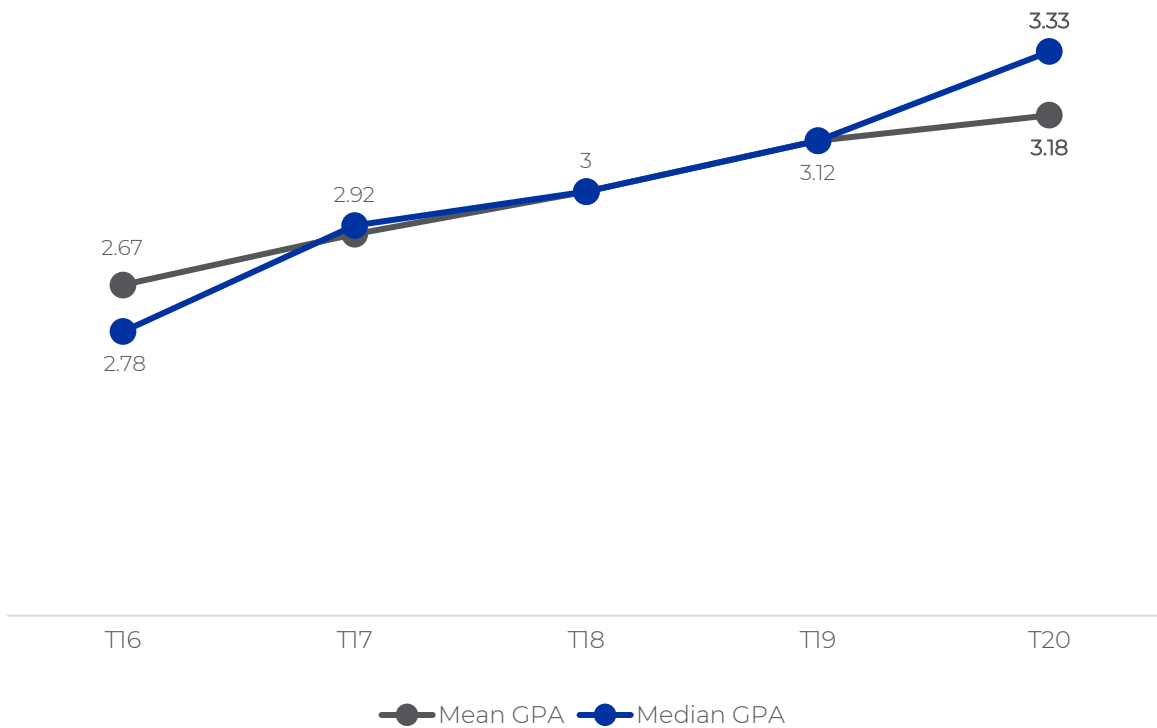

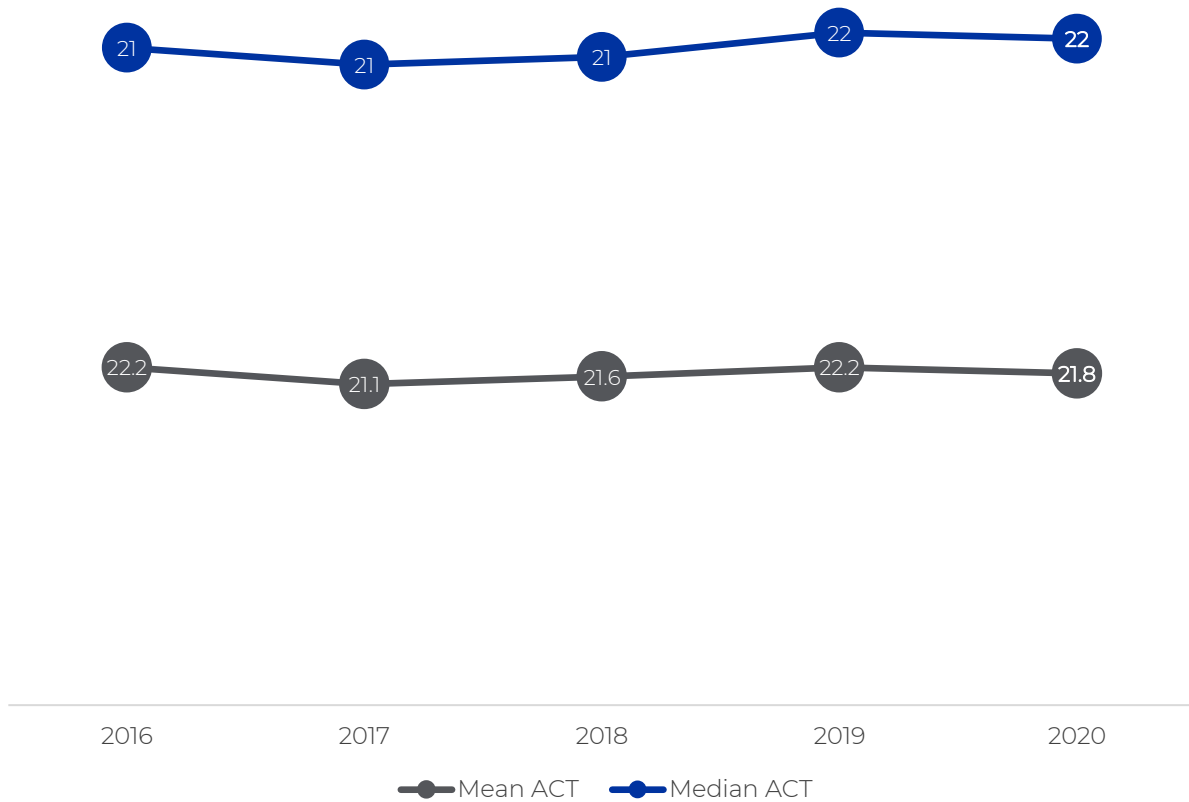

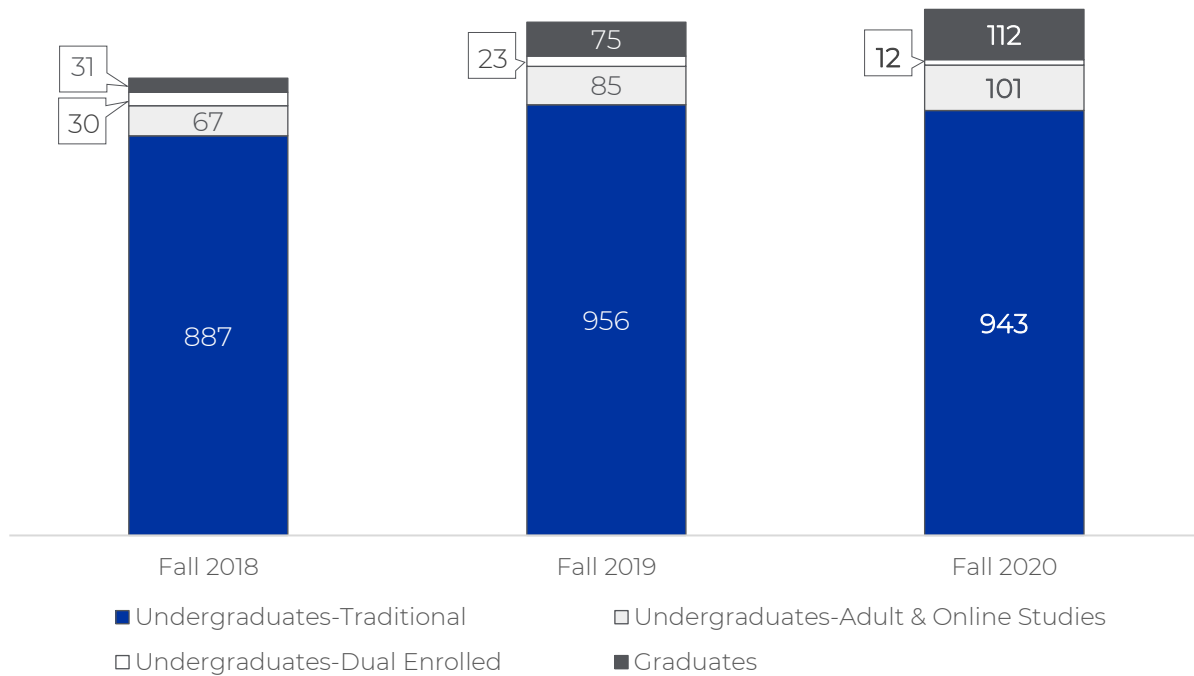
#### F. Freshman 2020 Cohort ACT Scores – Chart



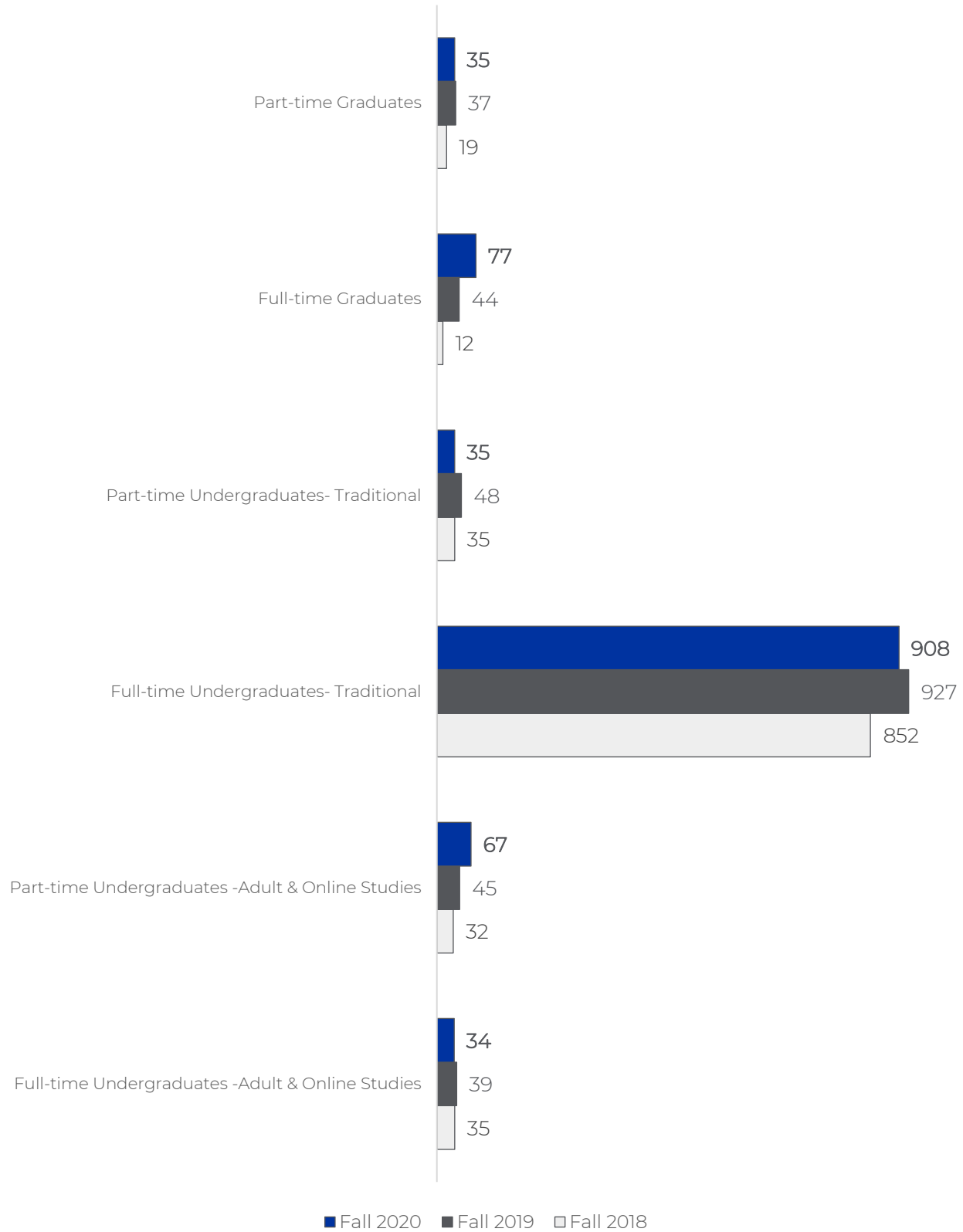
### G. 3-Yr. Enrollment Trends by Level – Chart



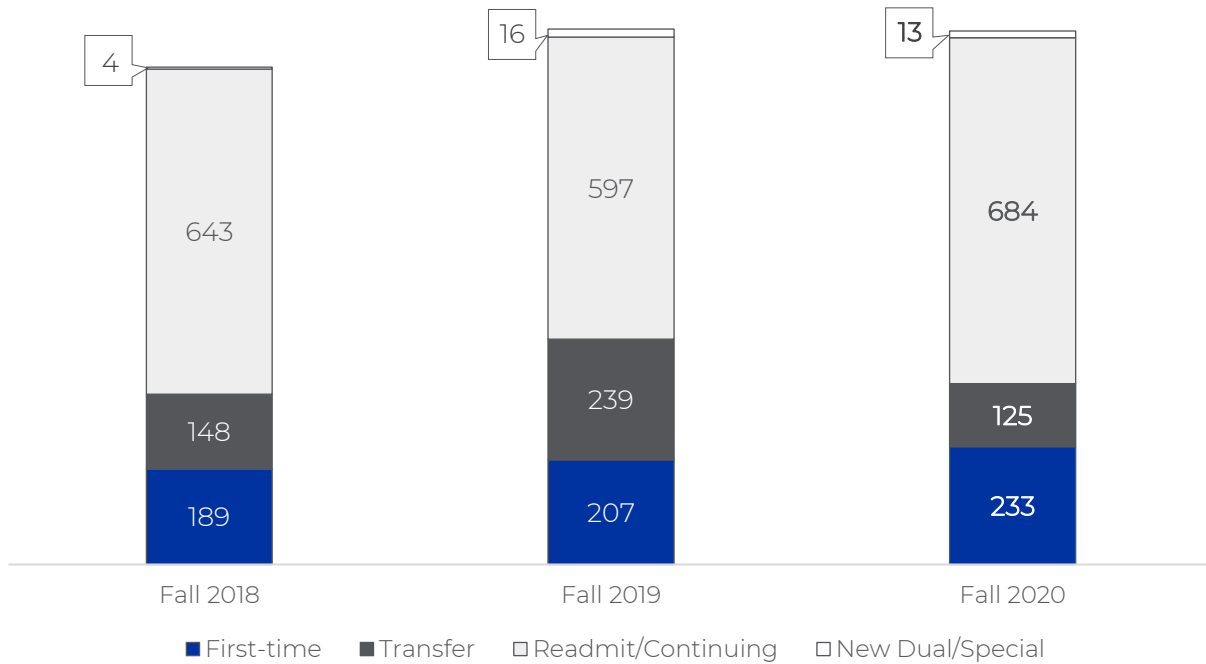

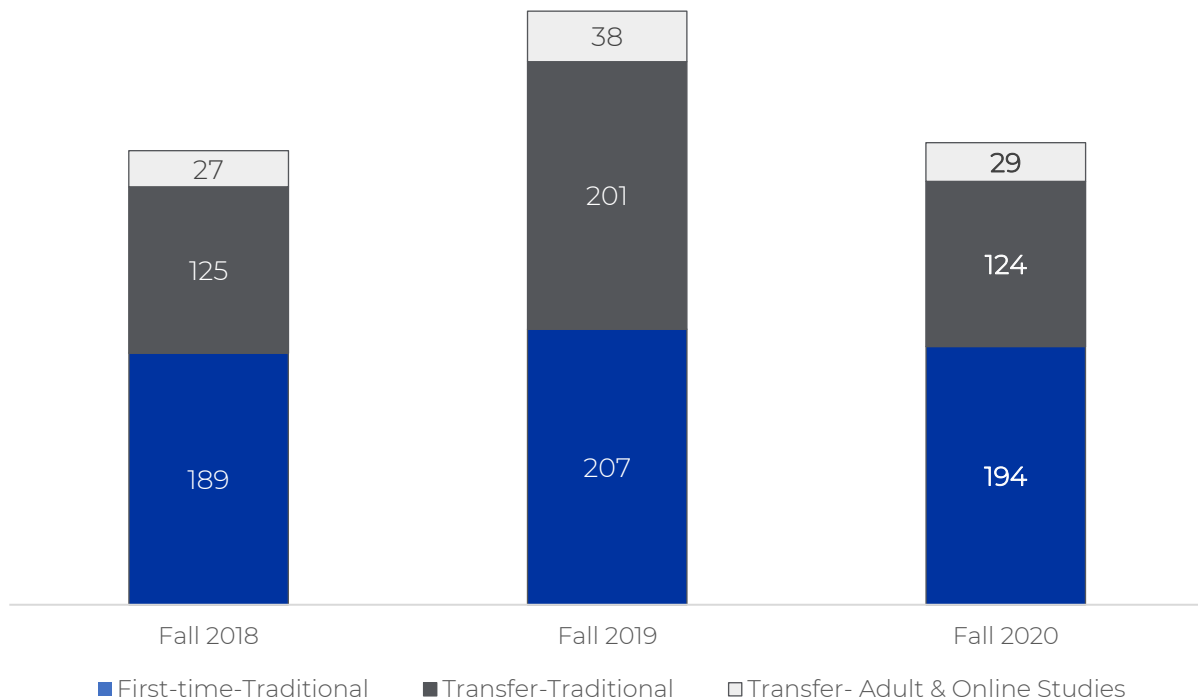
### I. 3-Yr. Enrollment Trends by Attendance Status (Excludes Dual Enrolled) – Chart



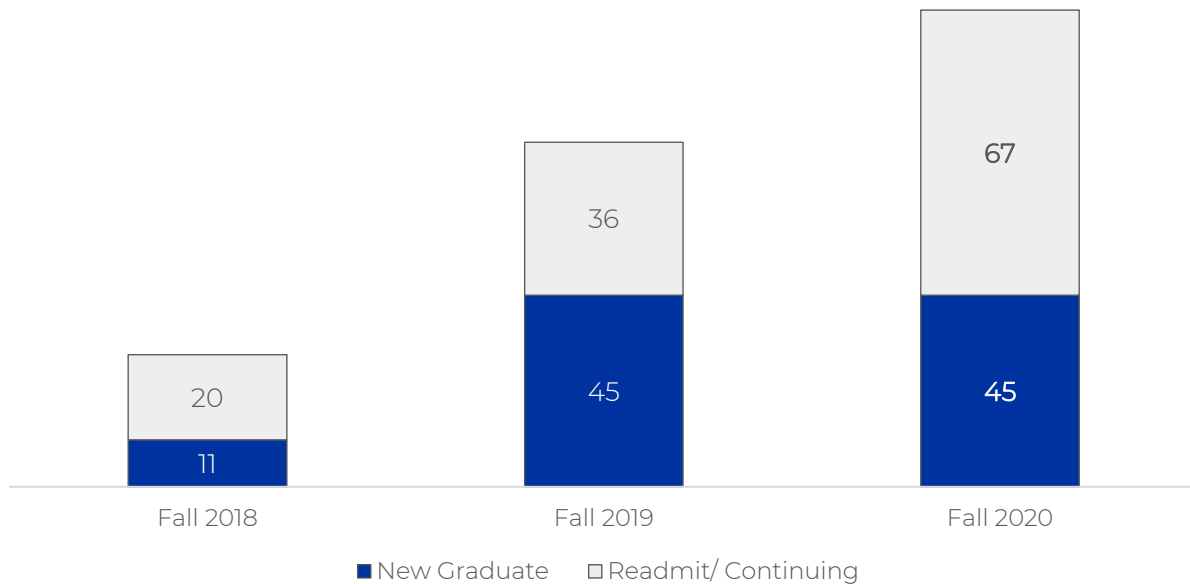
### J. 3-Yr. Undergraduate Enrollment Trends by Entry Status – Chart

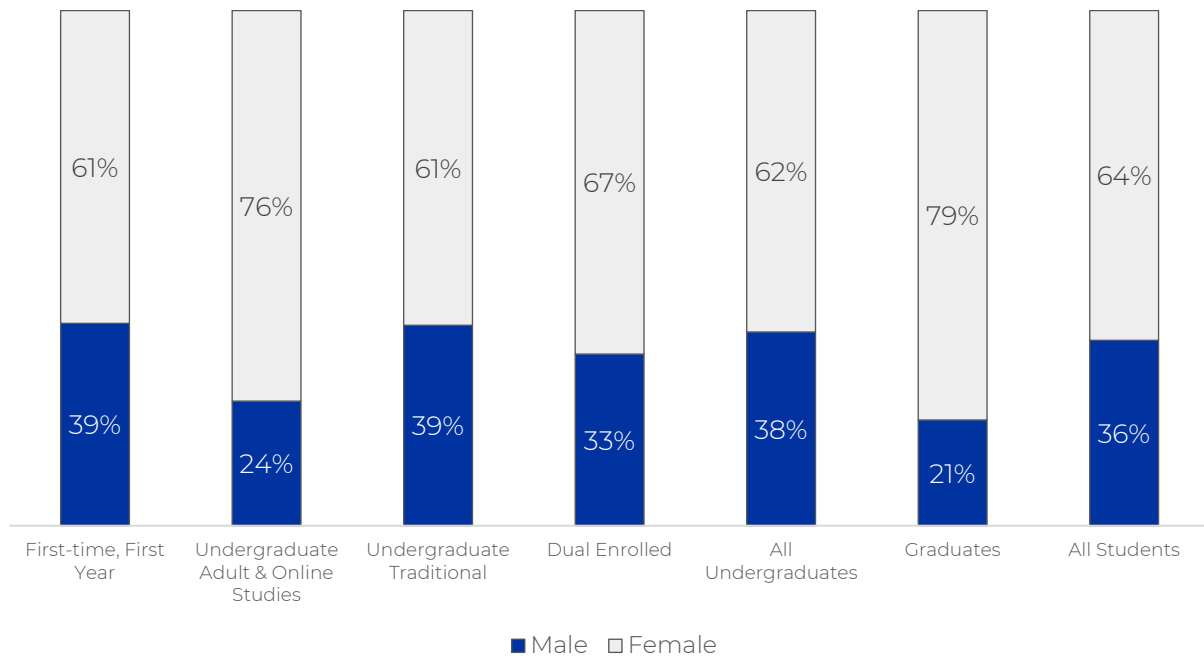

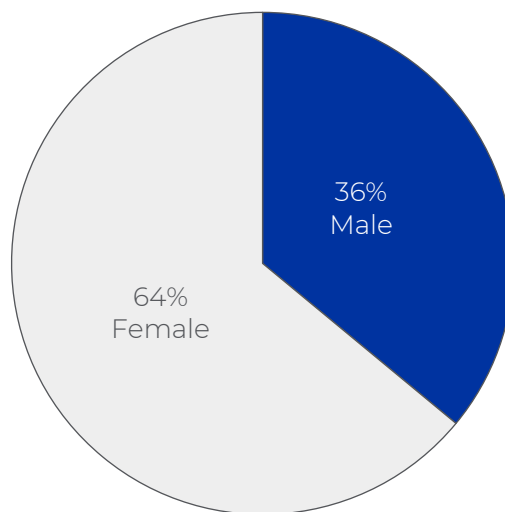

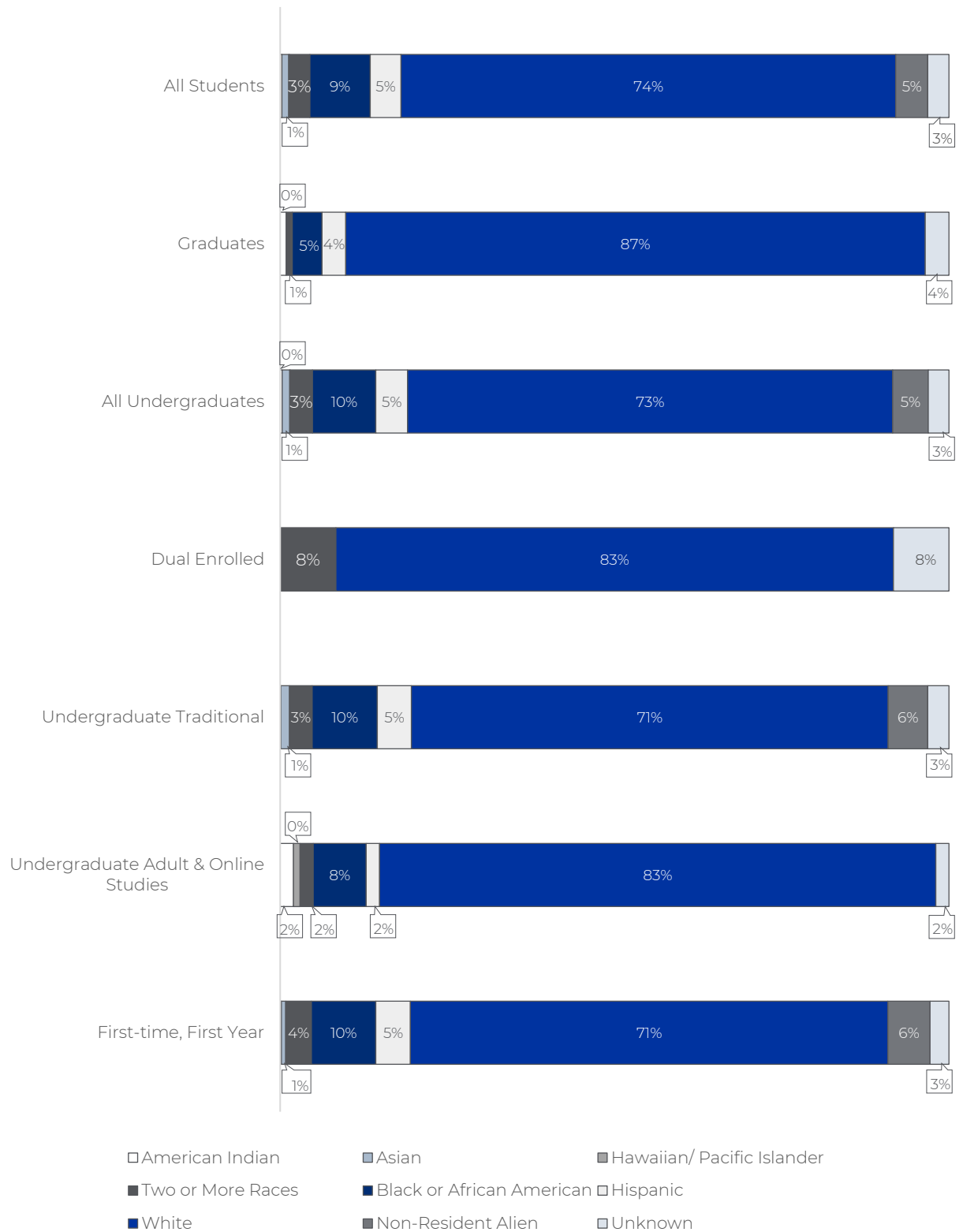
### A. Distribution by Gender – Table

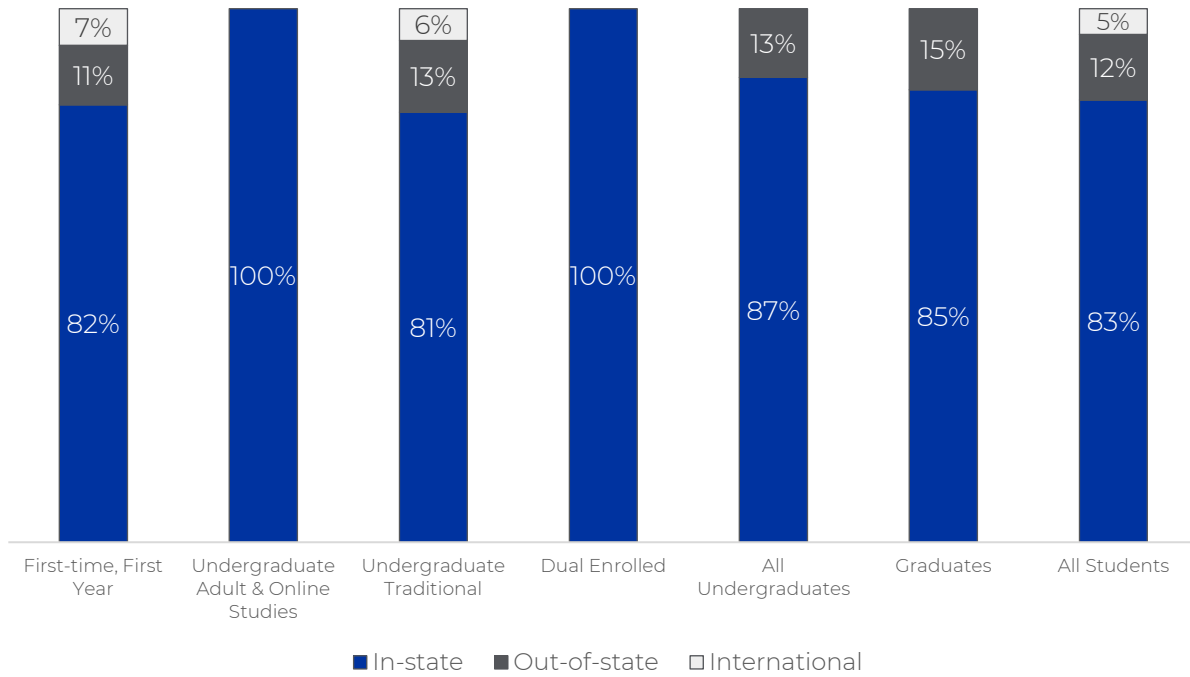

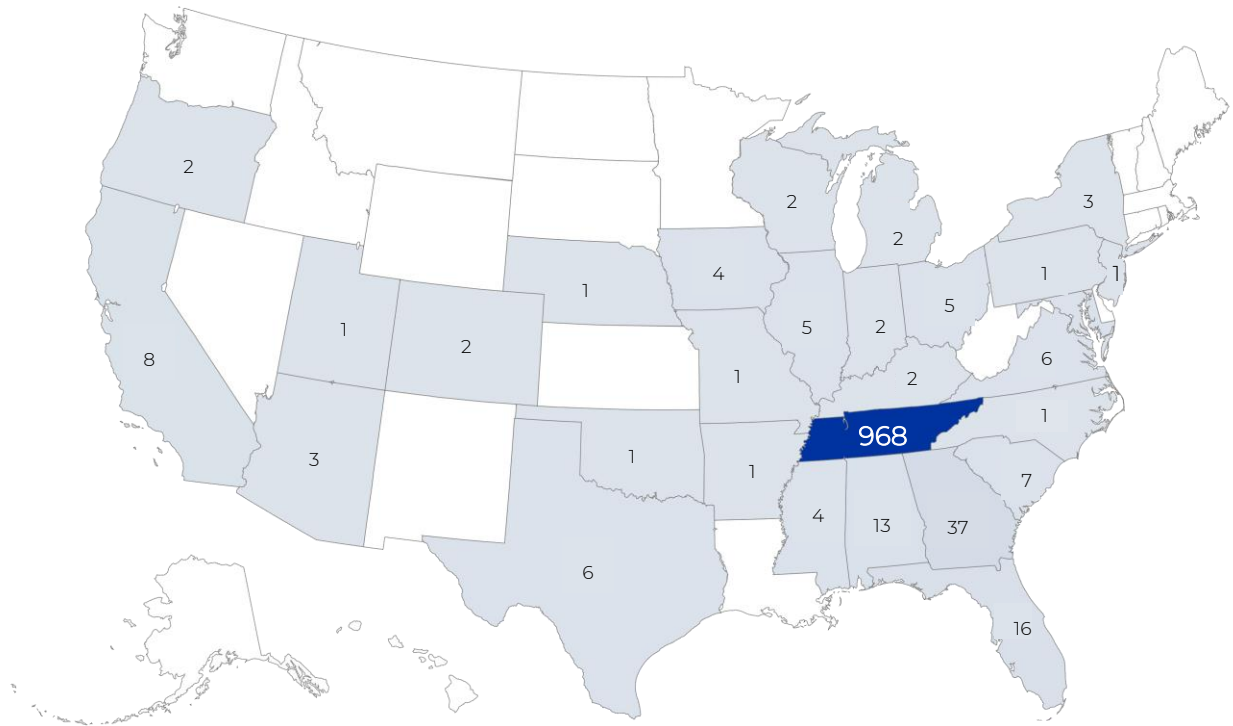

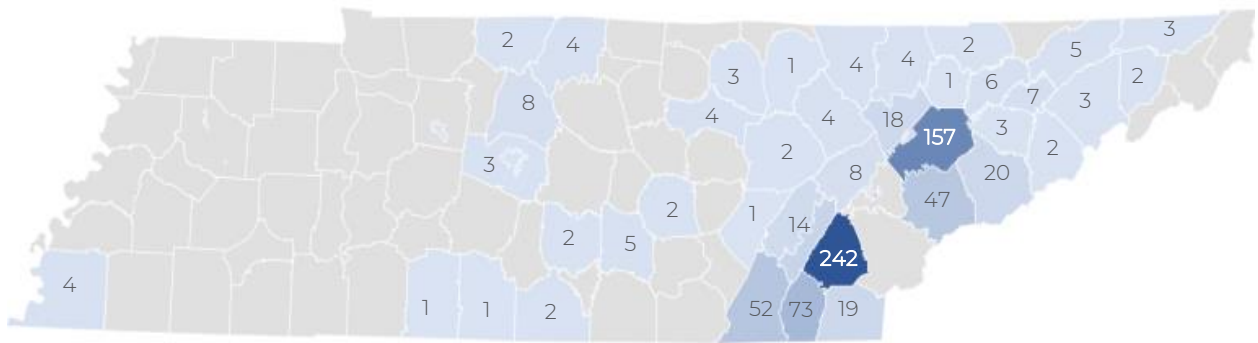
#### E. Geographic Representation of Students in United States – Map



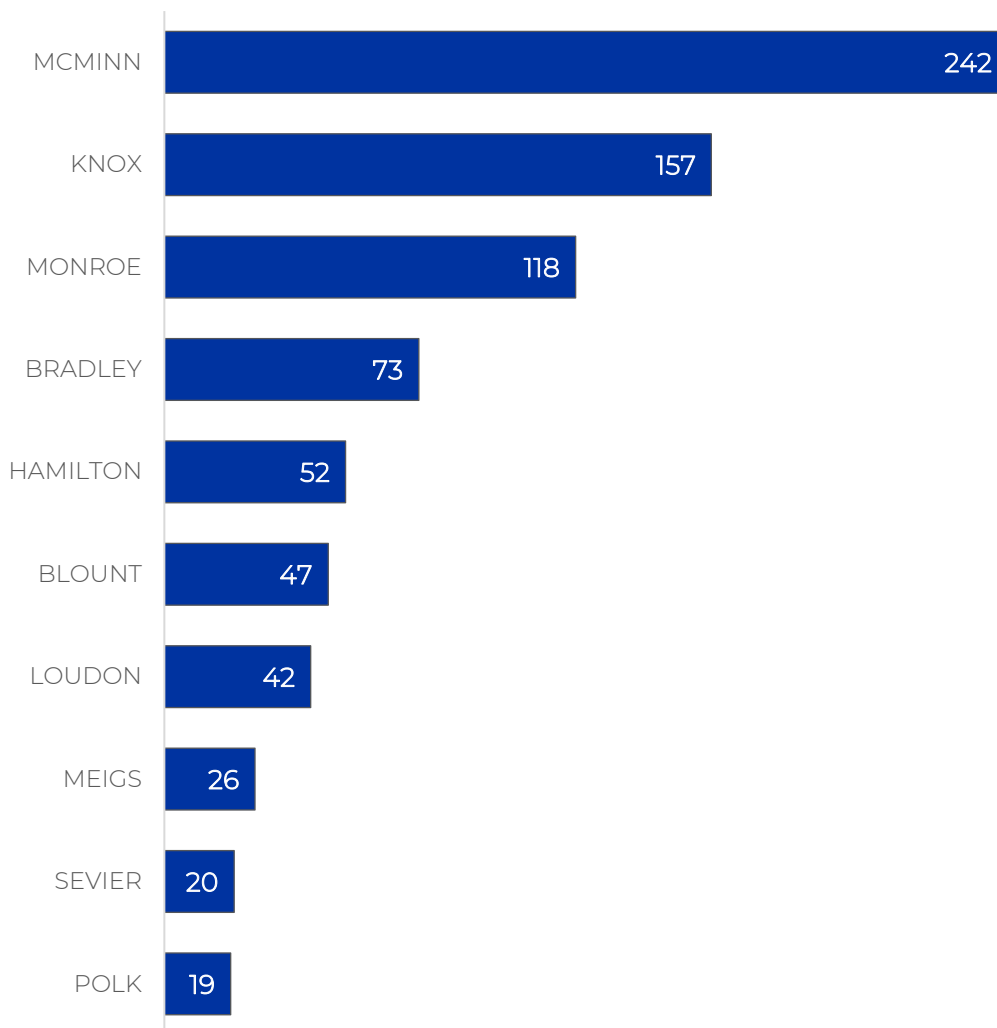

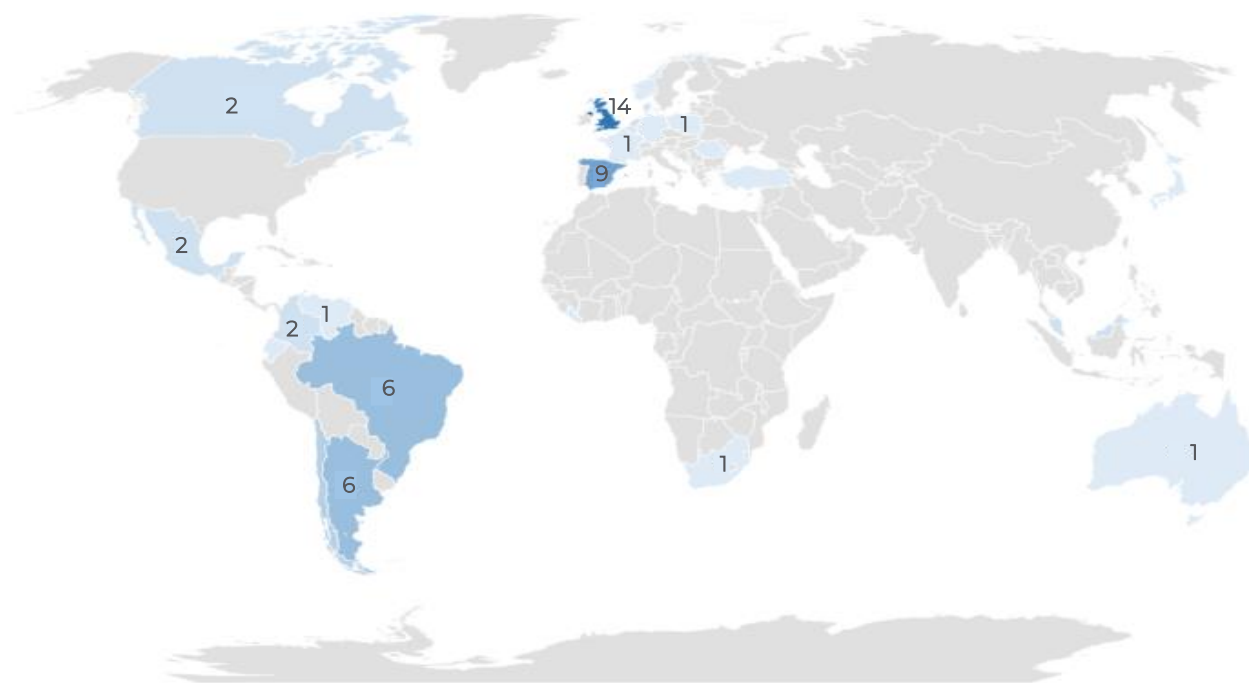
### G. Geographic Representation of Counties in Tennessee – Map



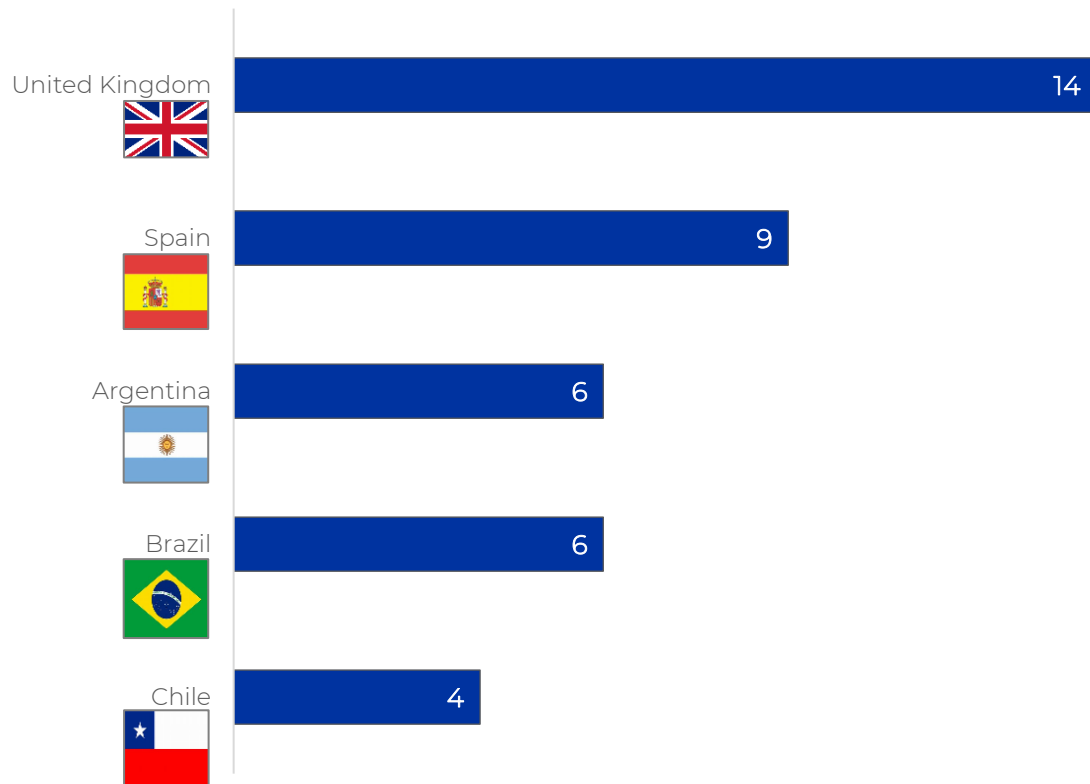
### H. Top Enrolled Counties (within Tennessee) – Chart

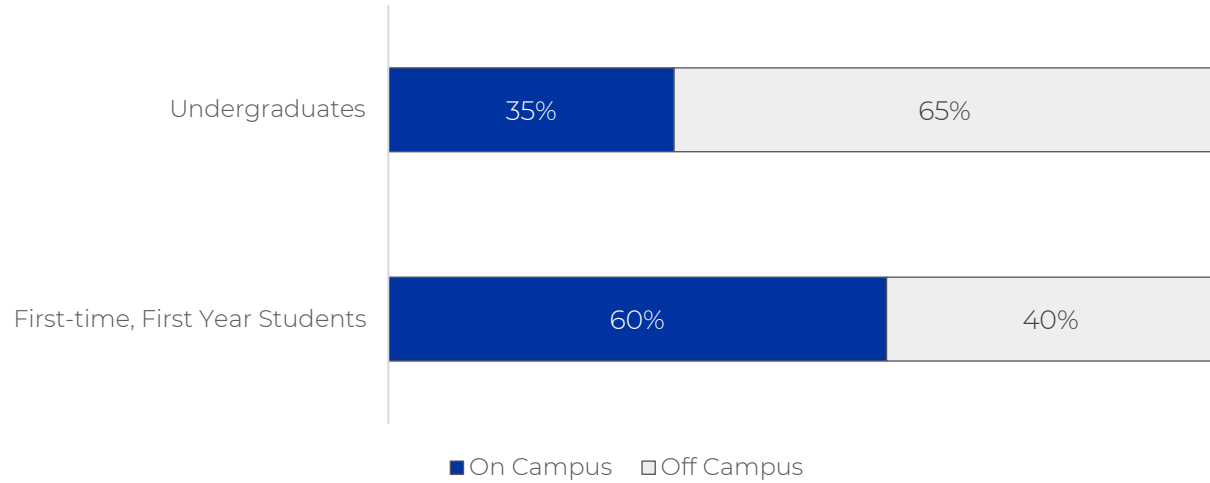

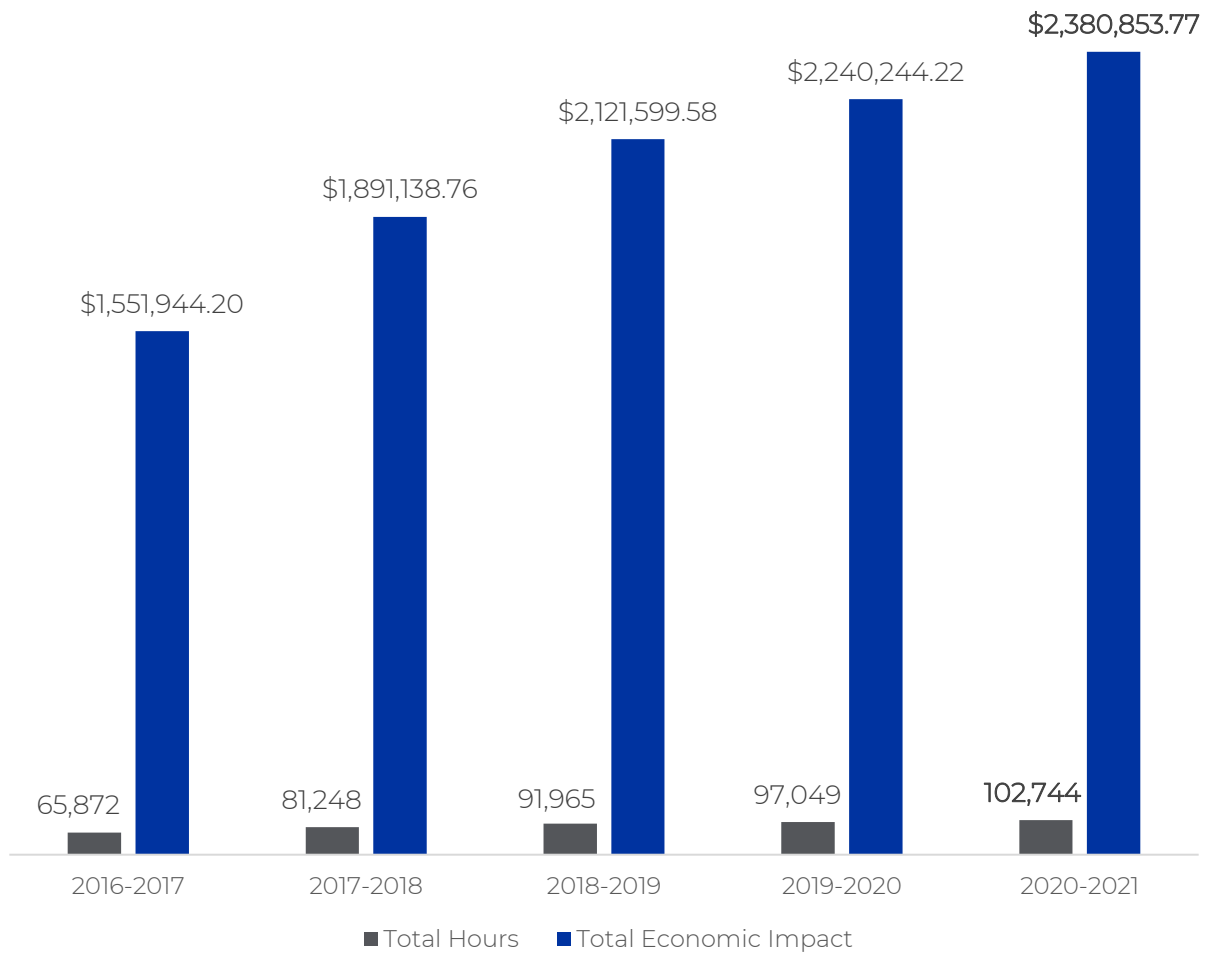

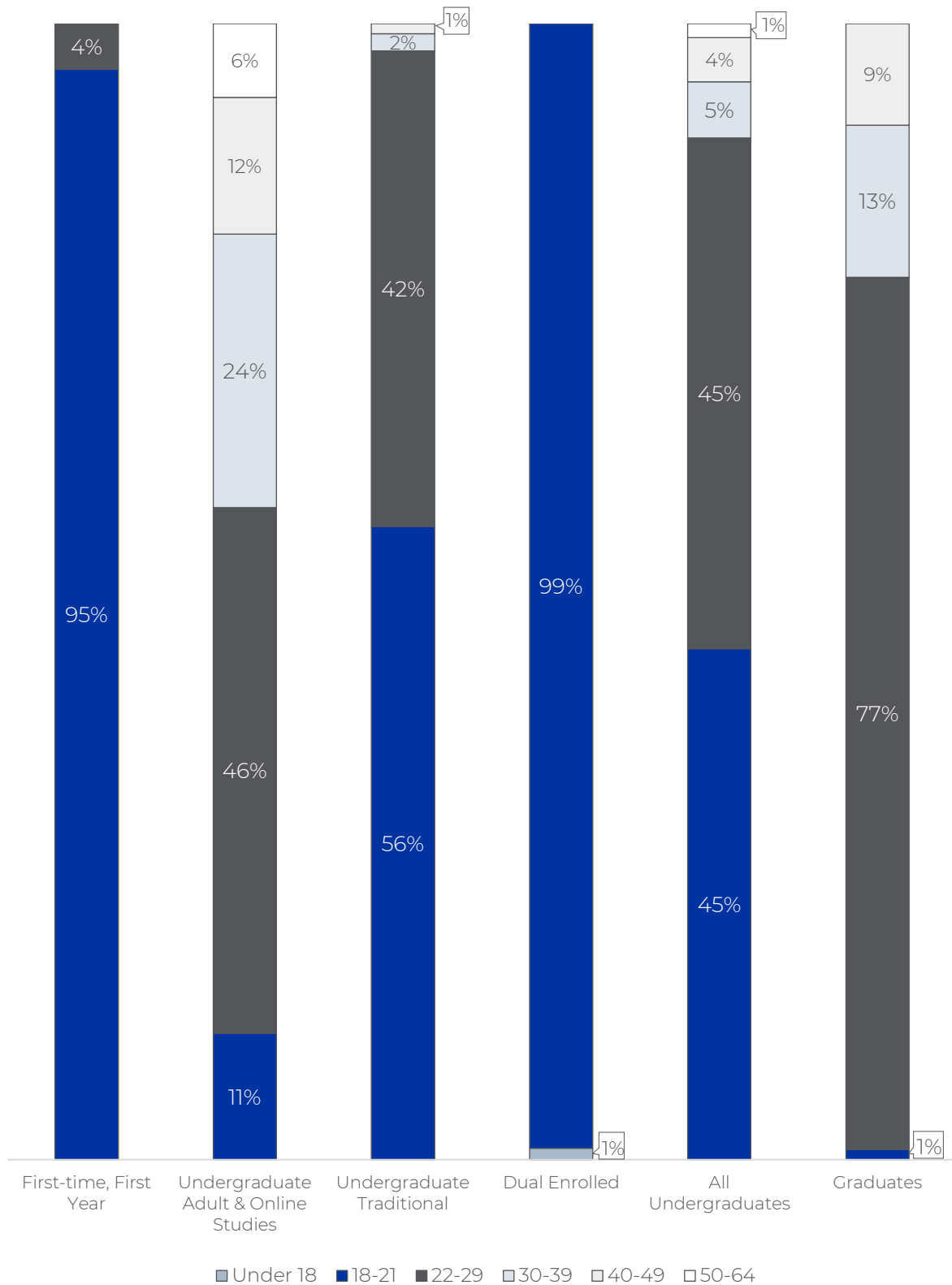
#### L. Distribution by Housing Status (at Census) – Chart



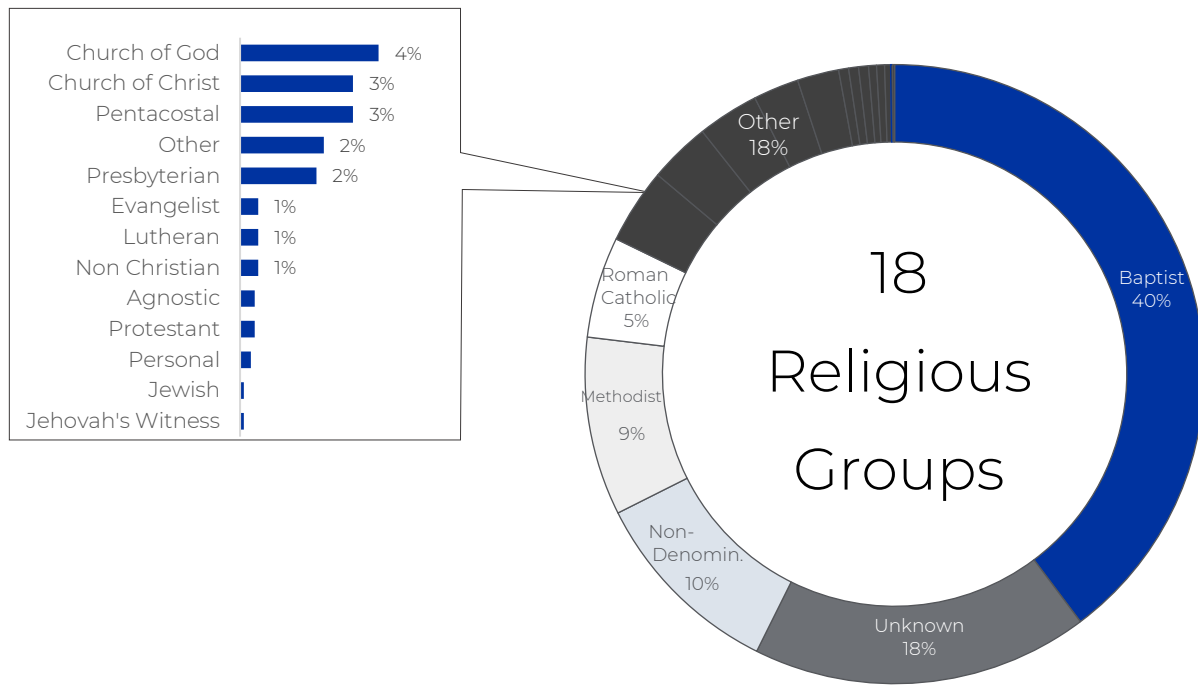

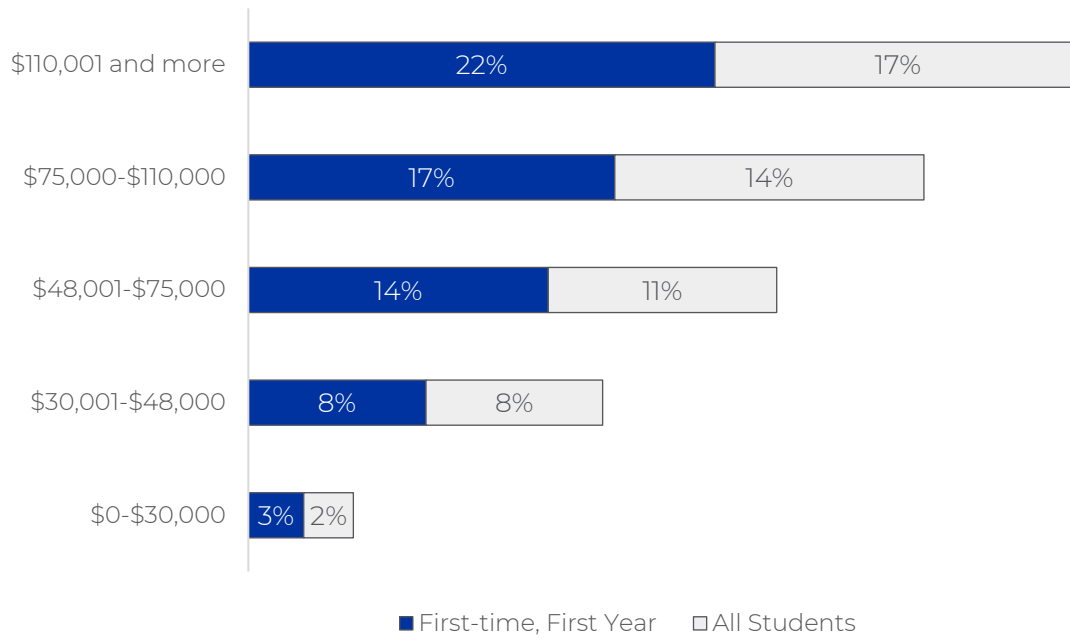

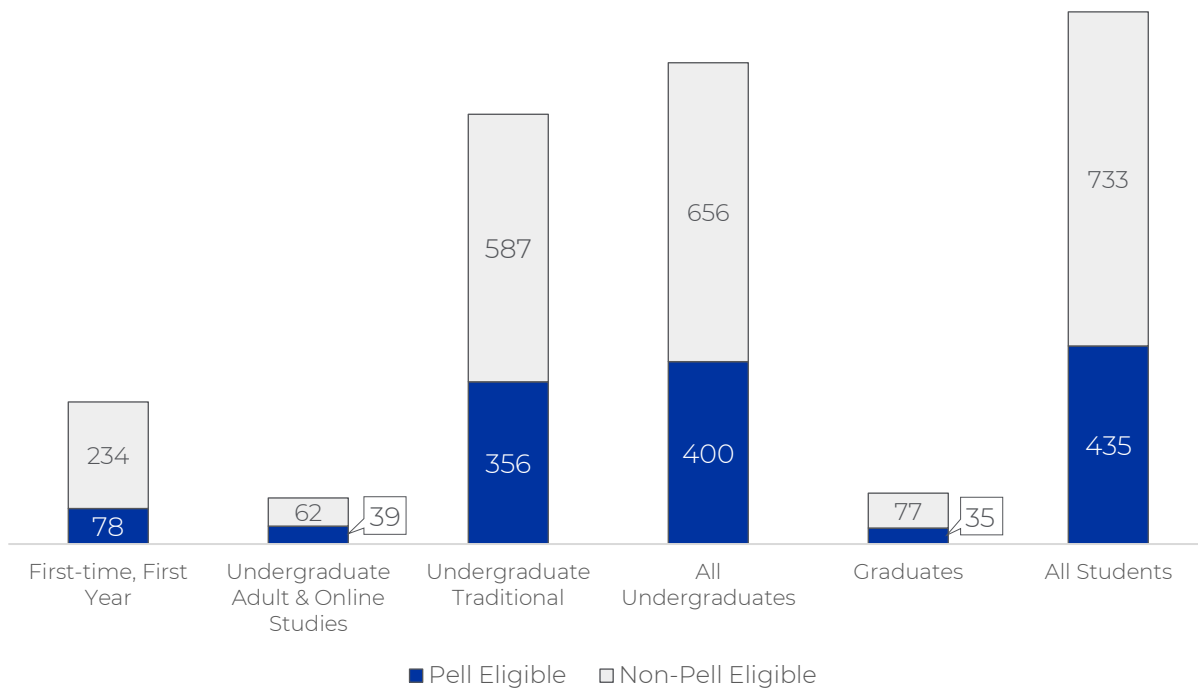

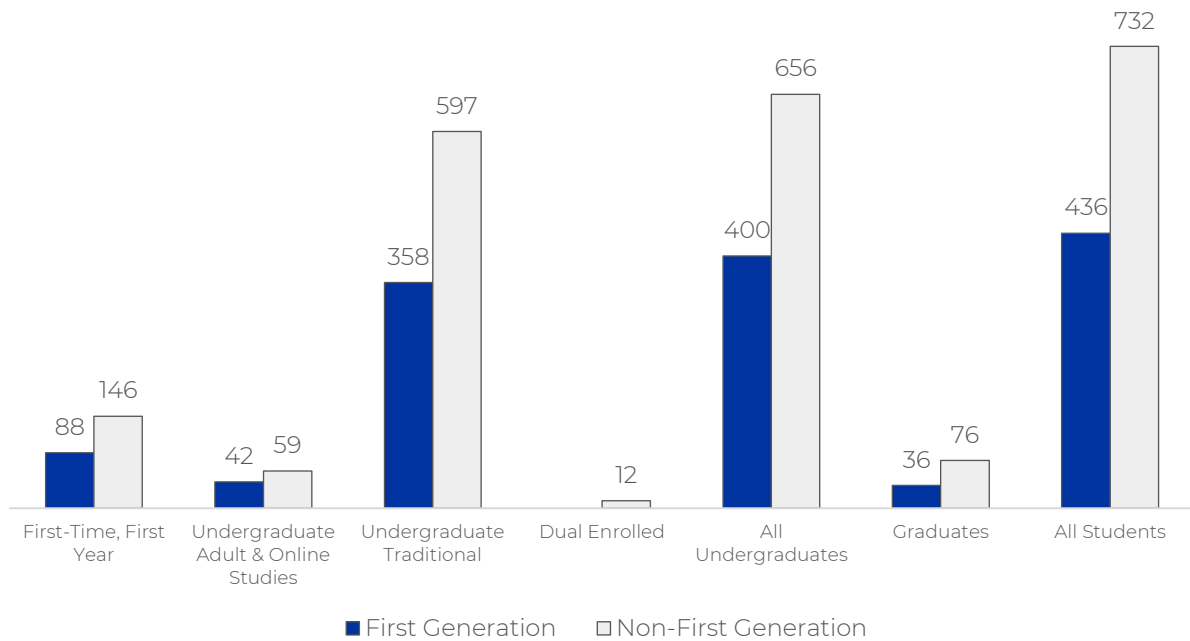
#### Q. Distribution by Income Level (As Reported at Census) – Chart



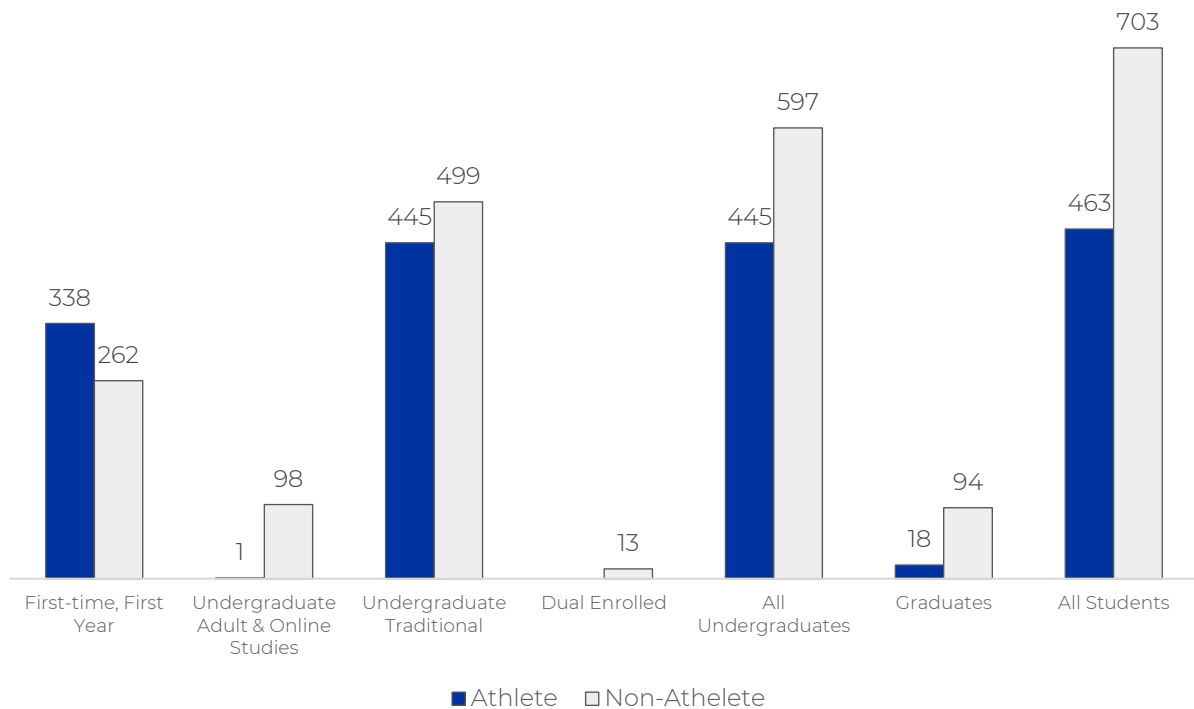
#### R. Distribution by Pell Eligible Status (at Census) – Chart

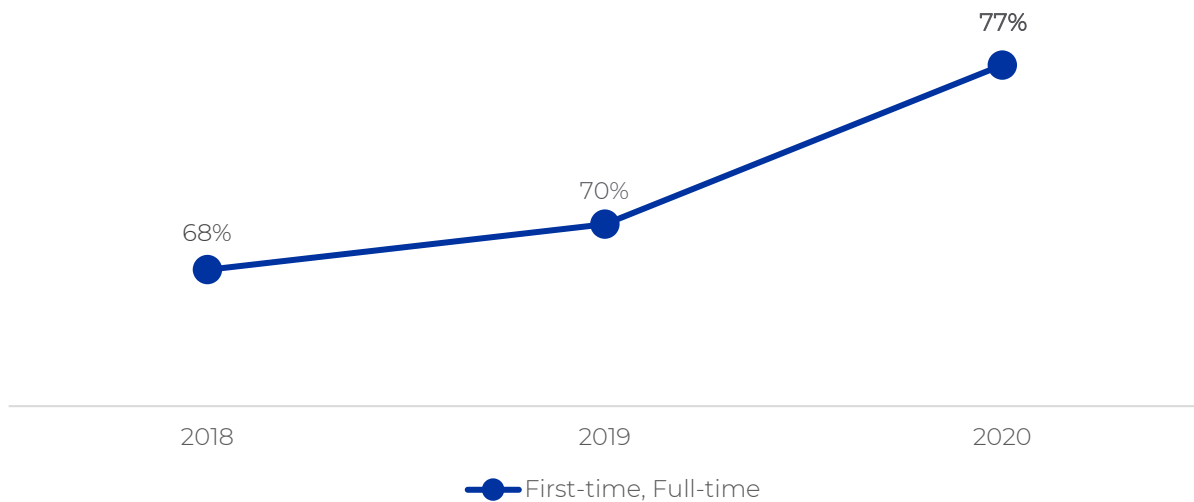

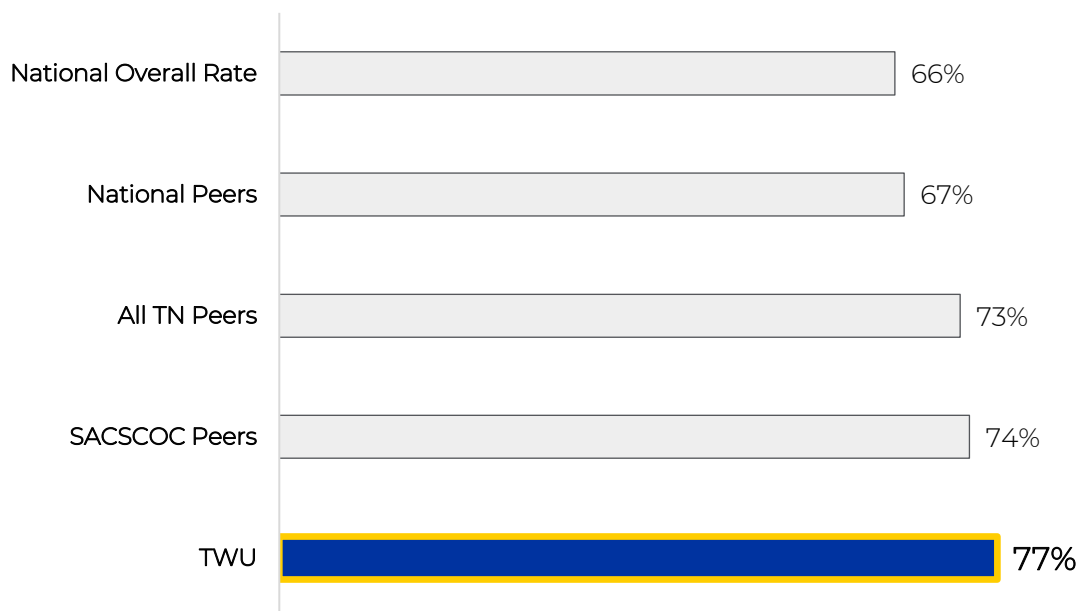

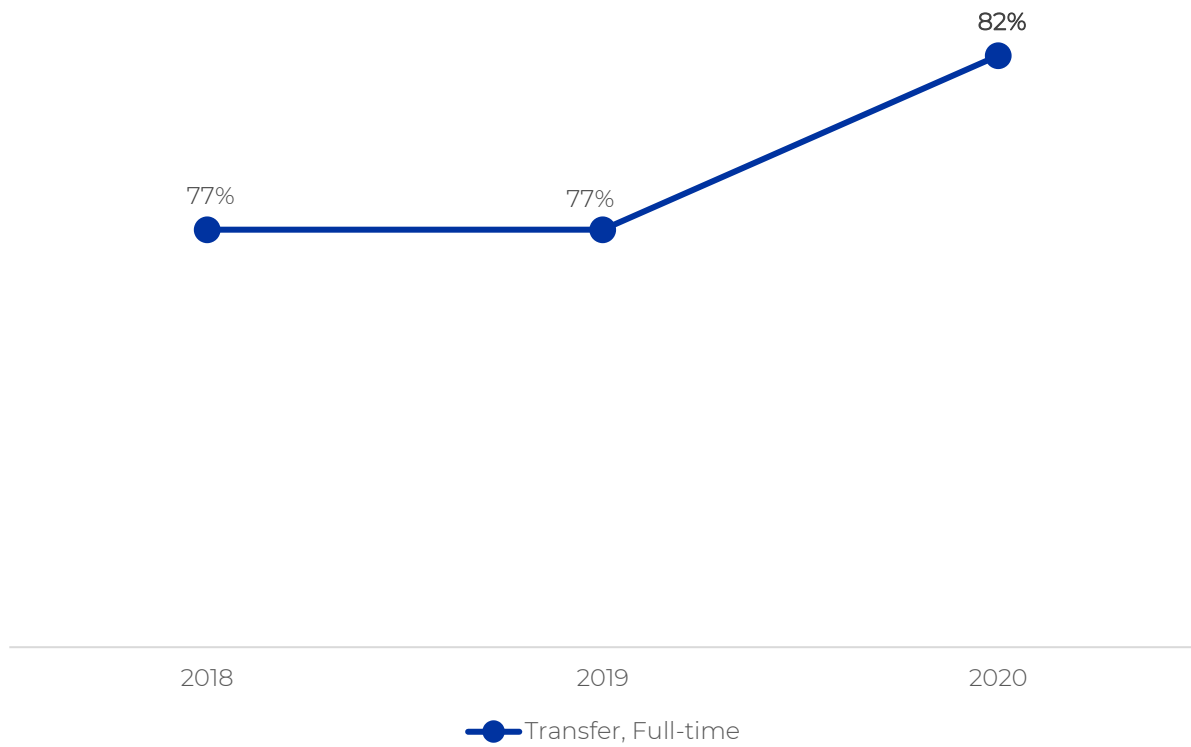
### B. Retention Trends for Fall to Fall – First-Time, Full-Time Cohort – Chart



### C. Comparison of Retention on National, State, and SACSCOC Peer Levels – Table

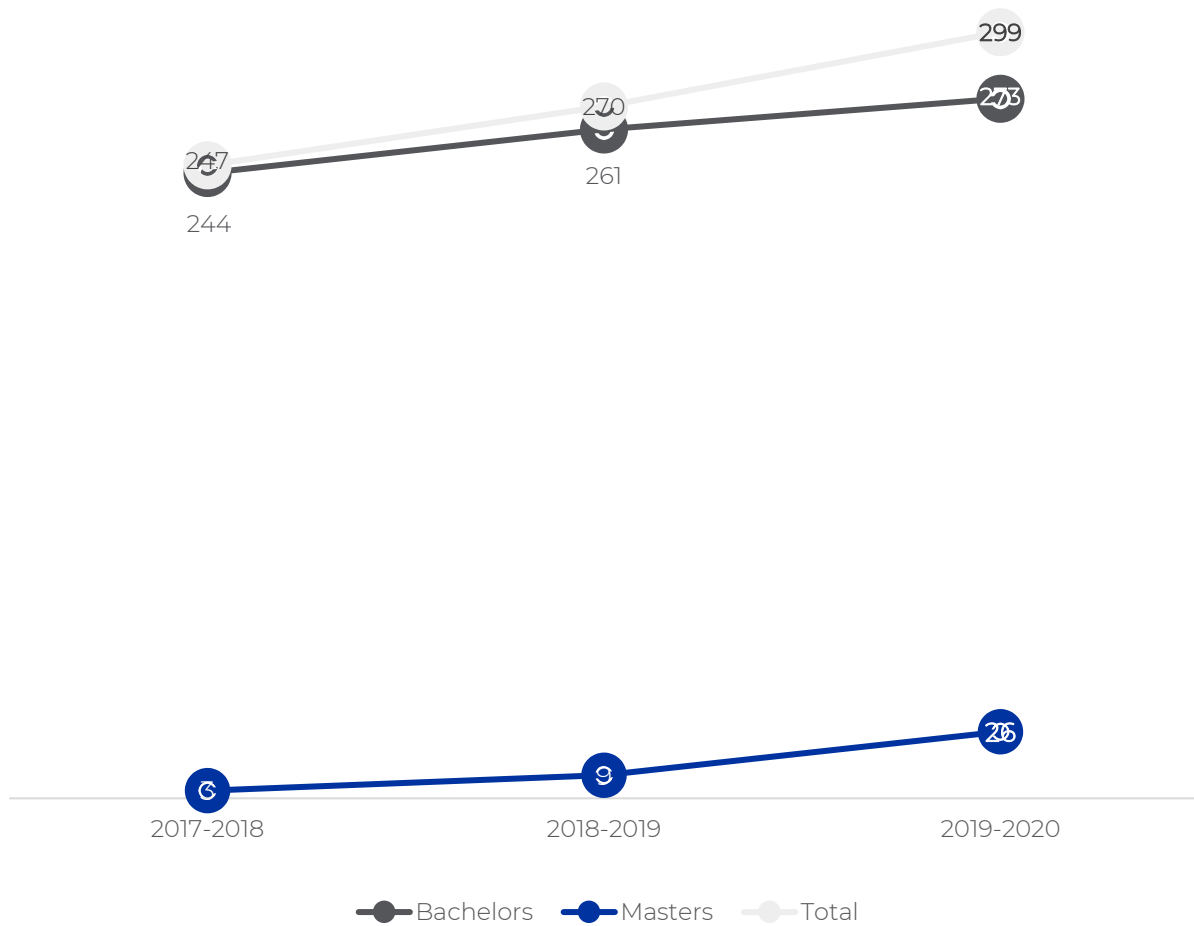


#### D. Retention Trends for Fall to Fall – Transfer Cohort –Chart

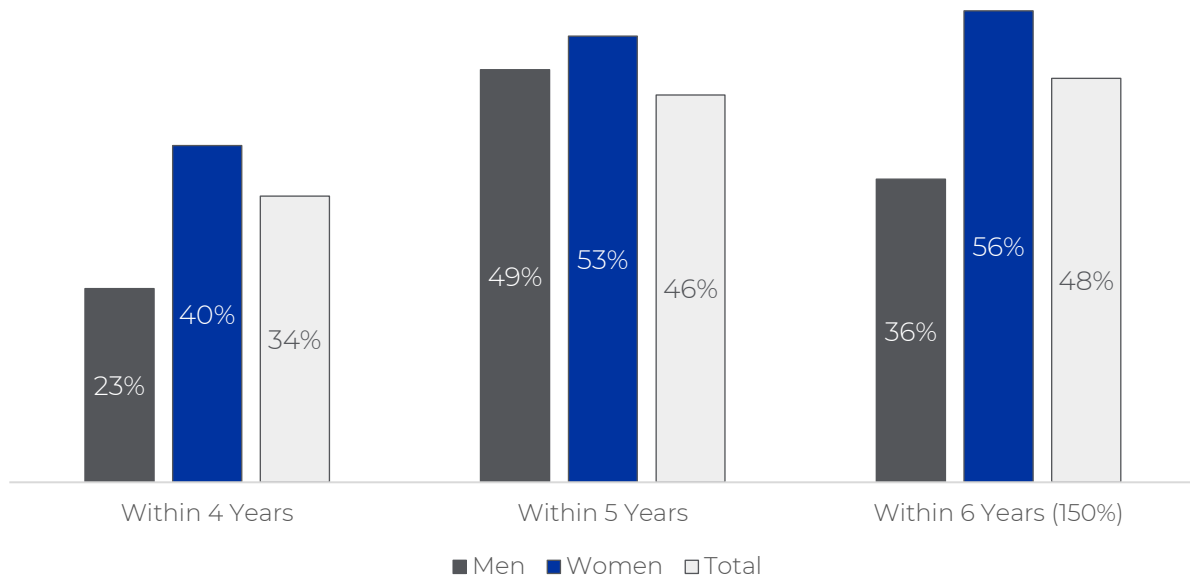

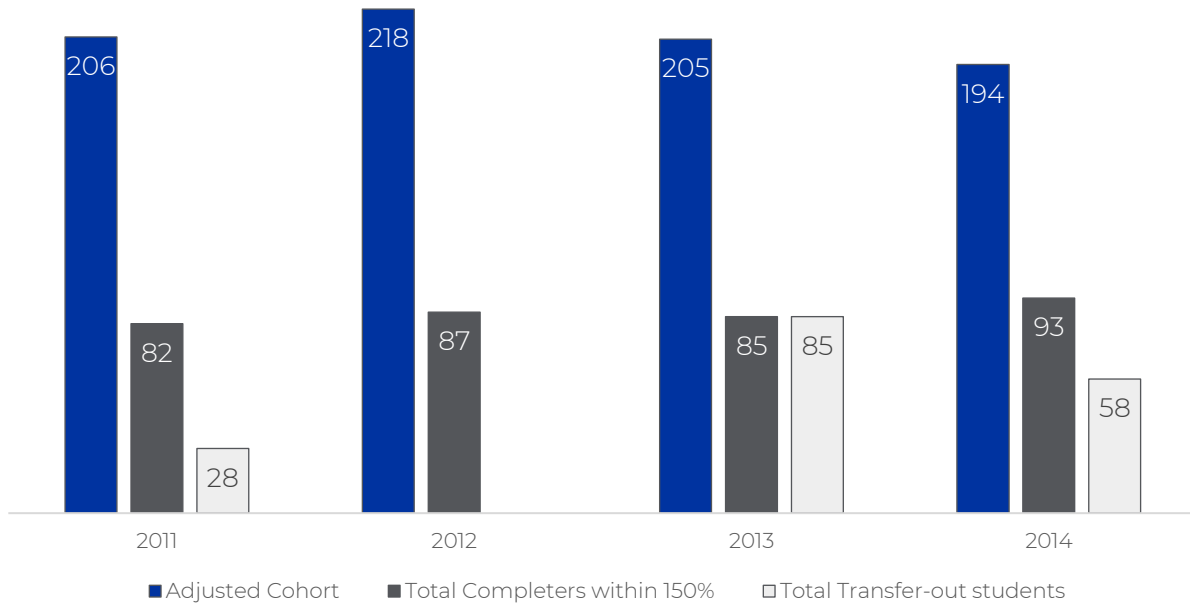

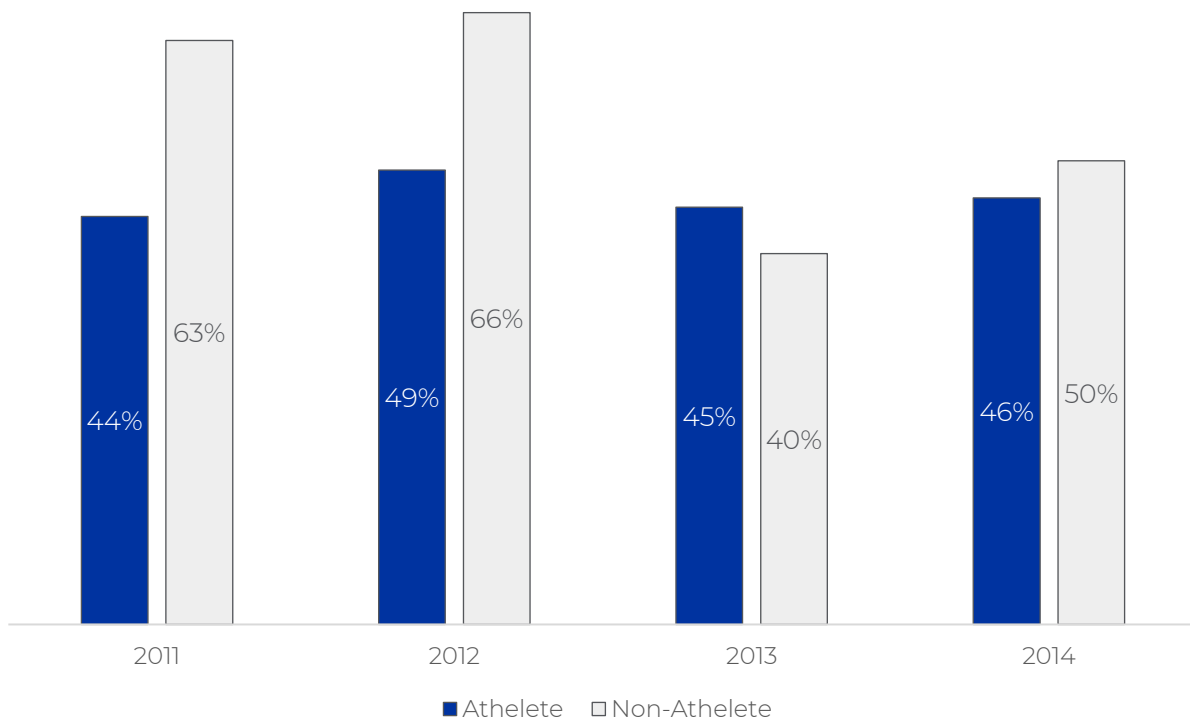

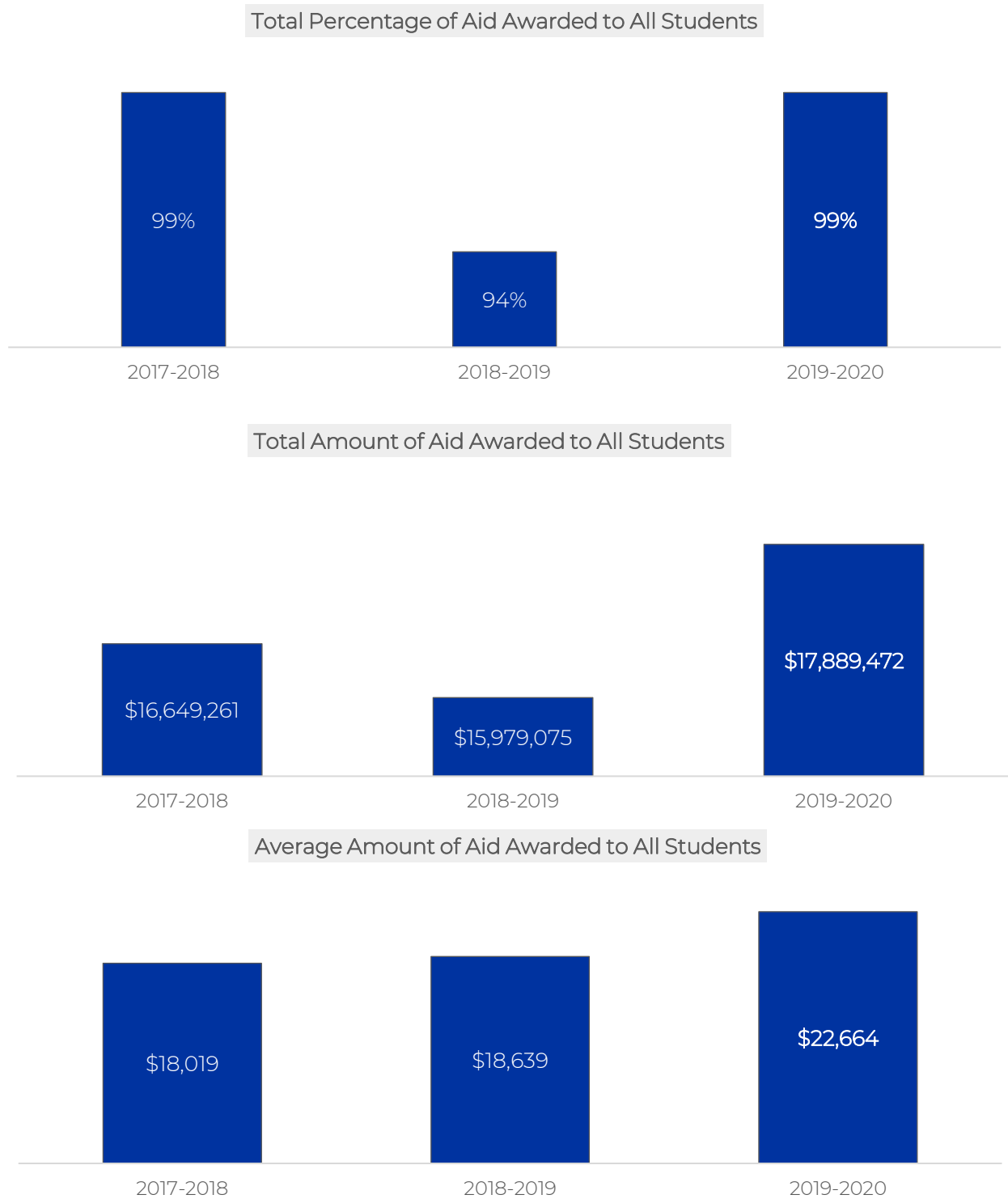


F. 6-Year Federal Graduation Rates Athletes and Non-Athletes – Chart

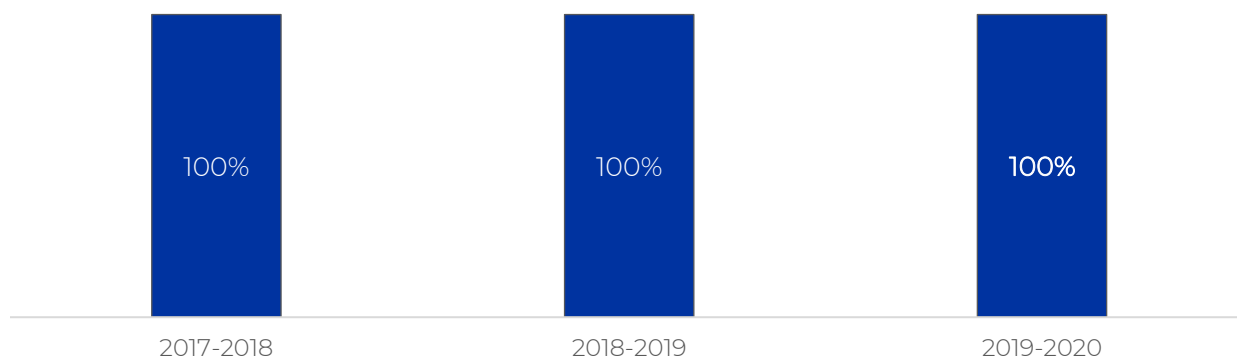
### A. 3-Yr. Trend Financial Aid Awards for All Students\* – Chart



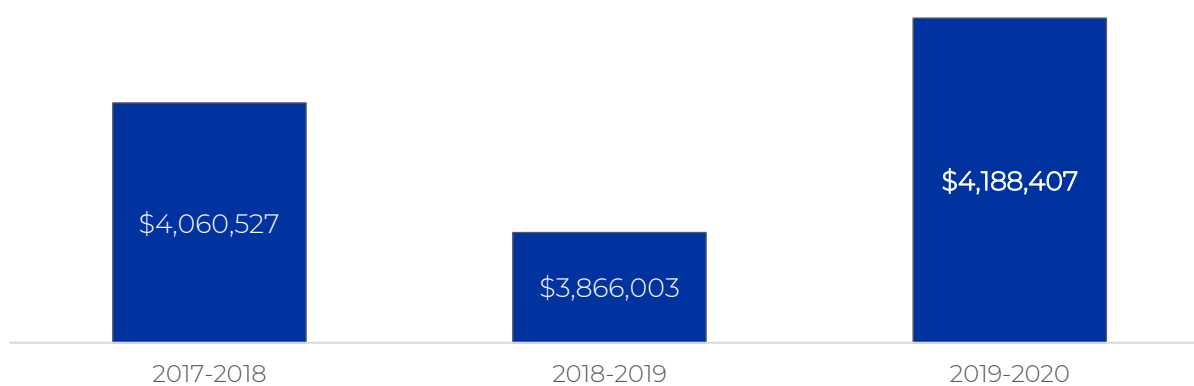

## B. 3-Yr. Trend Financial Aid Awards for First-Time Freshman\* – Chart

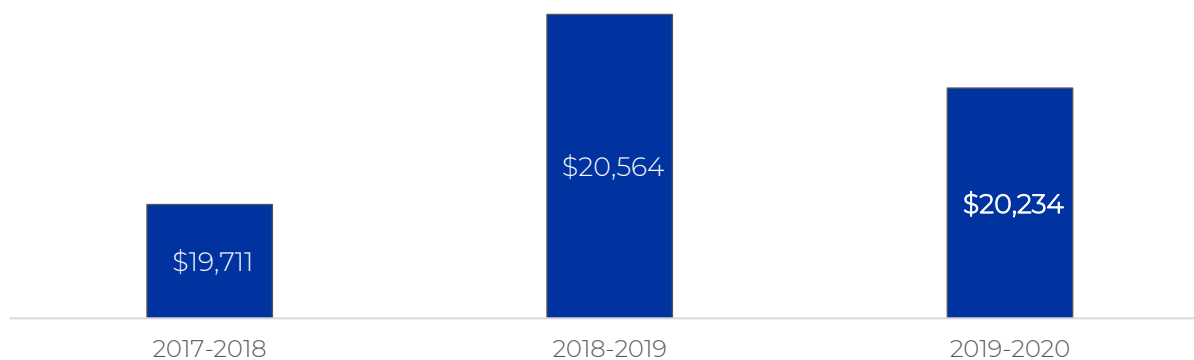
Total Percentage of Aid Awarded to First-Time Freshmen



Total Amount of Aid Awarded to First-Time Freshmen

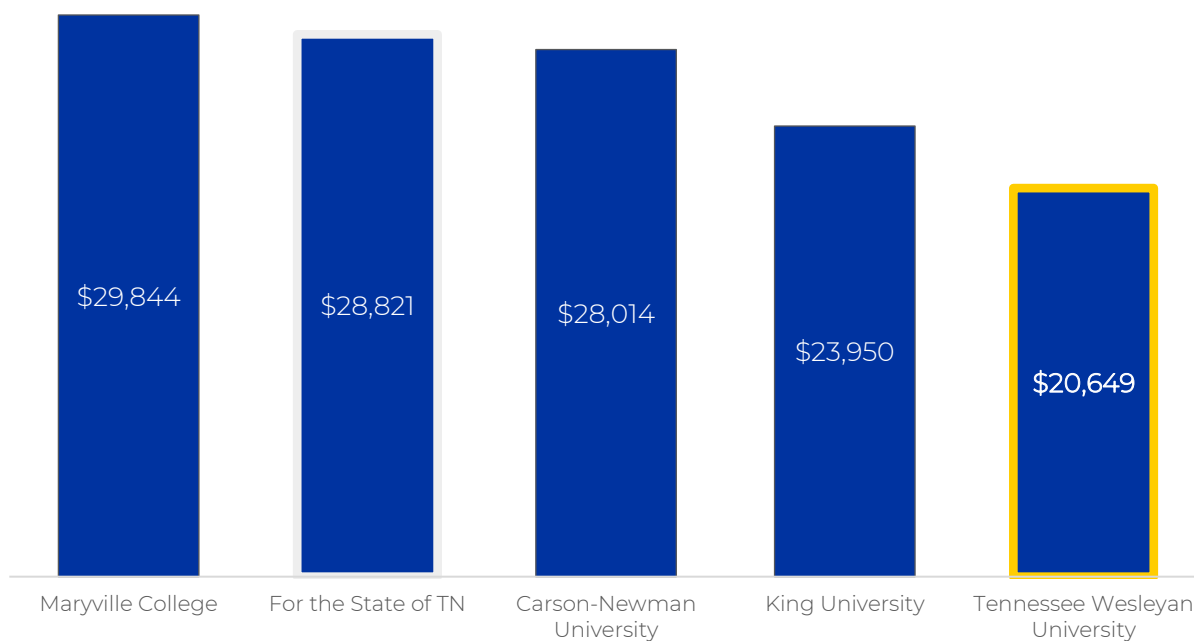


Average Amount of Aid Awarded to First-Time Freshmen

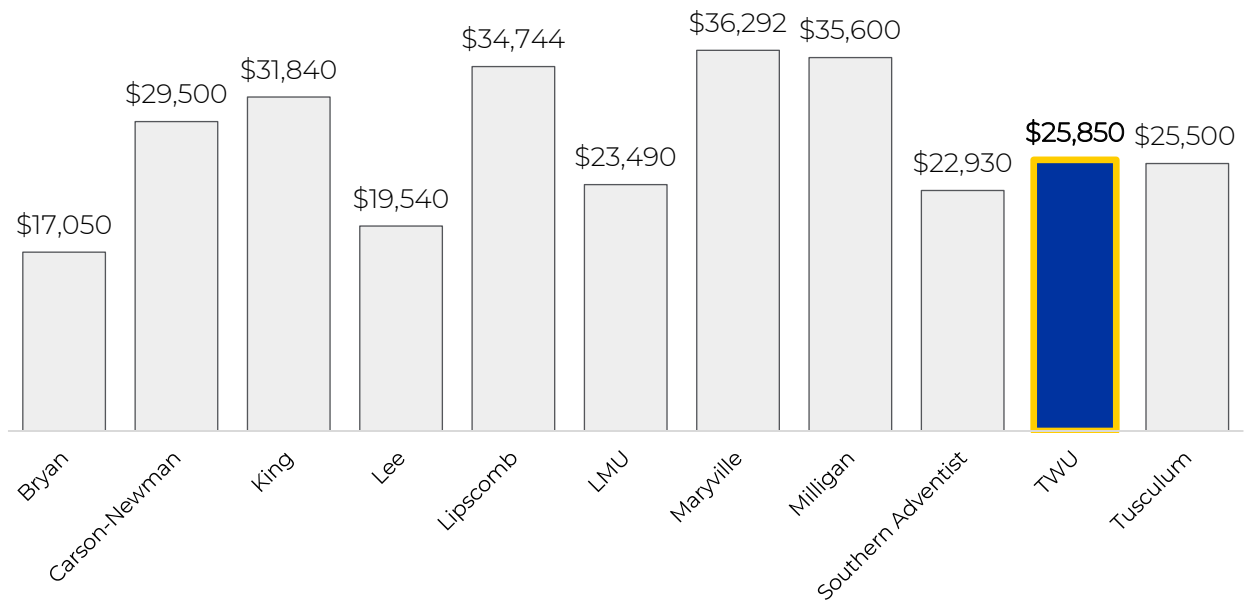

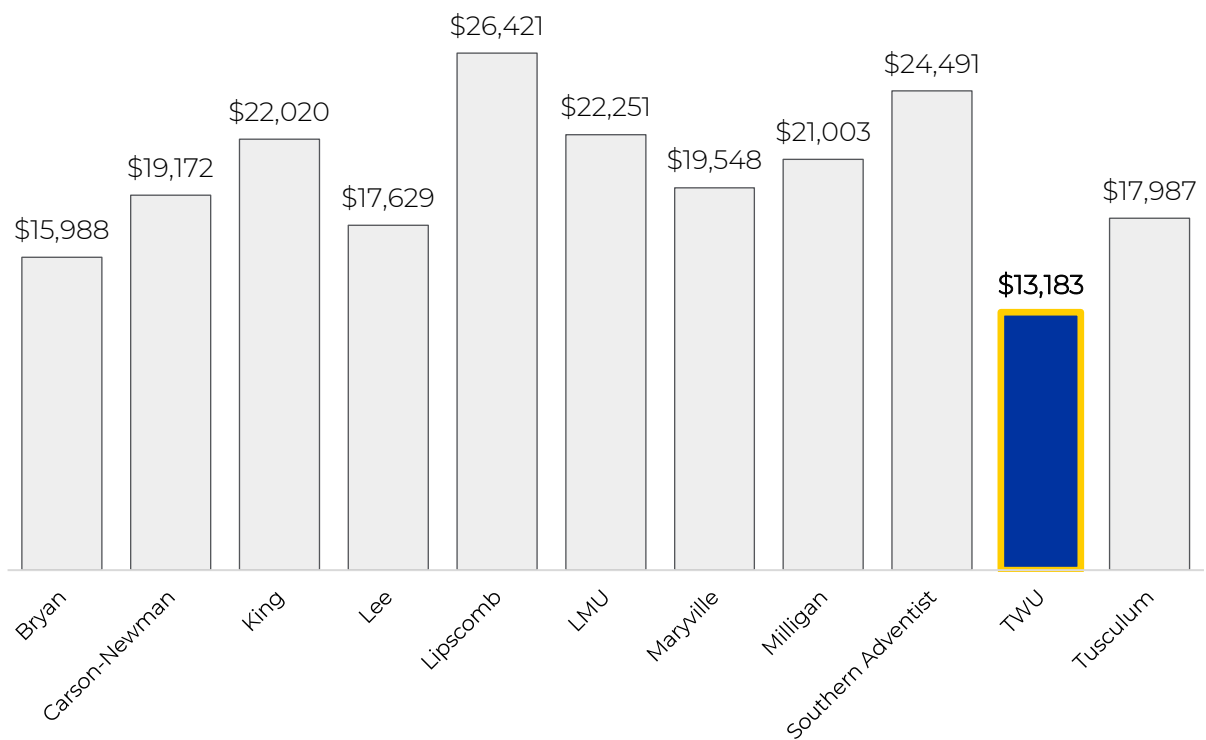

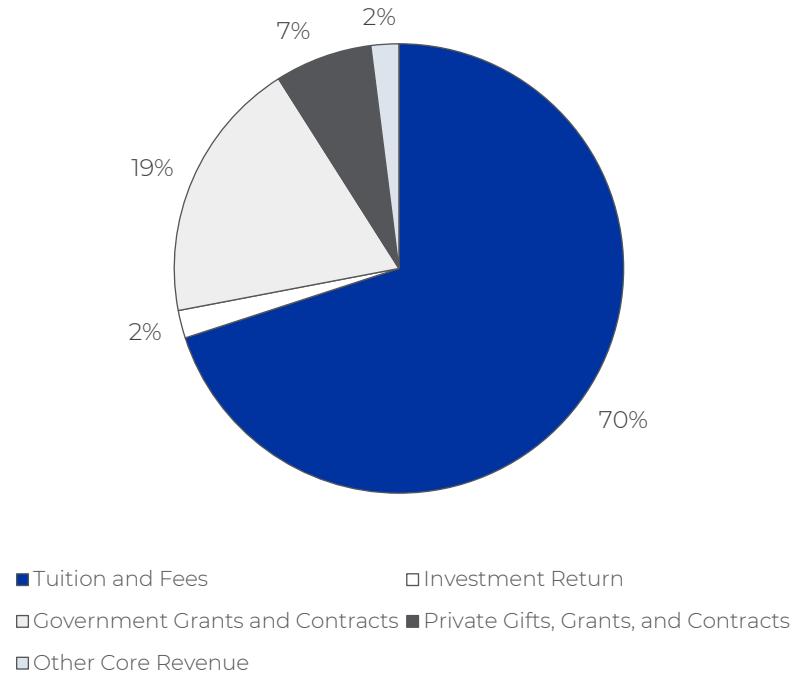

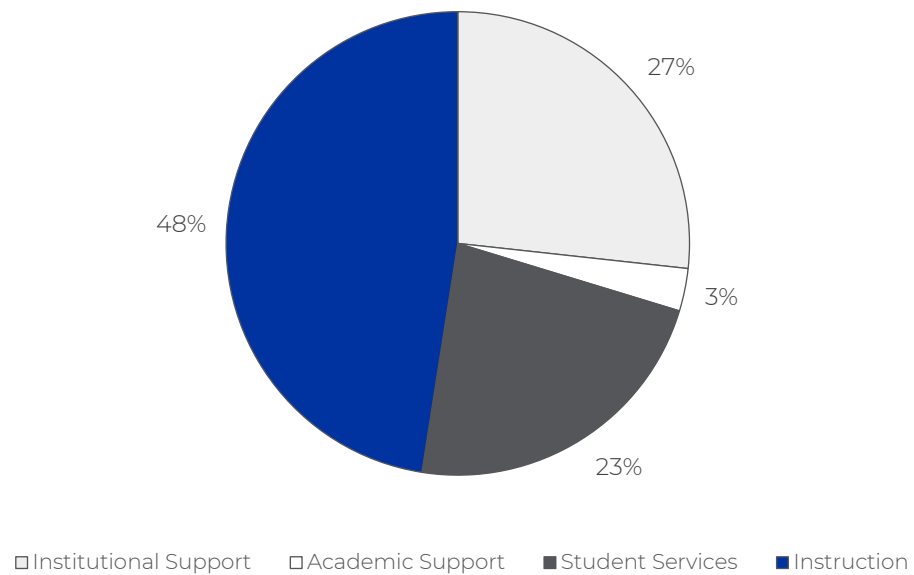
